U. S. SOLDIERS AND MEXICAN REBELS EXCHANGE SHOTS TODAY

No One Wounded During Fusillade at El Paso but Buildings Are Hit.

THINK REVOLUTIONISTS TRIED TO CONCEAL MOVE

Believe That Motive of Volleys Was to Distract Soldiers on Guard.

EL PASO, Aug. 3.—About fifty shots were exchanged between the United States soldiers and unidentified parties from the Mexican side of the river last night in East El Paso.

After the first three or four shots were fired, the soldiers on guard on the American side opened fire. Bullets then came faster from the Mexican side, several houses being struck.

One for \$47.50 drawn on the Bank of Oregon at North Bend in favor of Charles Daniels and signed "McDonald & Lane by C. S. McDonald," was cashed by the Claymore Saloon in Marshfield.

A third check for \$20 was cashed by S. S. Jennings of the White House Store, North Bend. It was drawn by N. W. May of Myrtle Point against the First National Bank of Bandon in favor of Joe Pierce.

Chas. Thom of the North Bend brewery is also reported to have cashed a check for \$45 for the gentleman stranger.

Many May Be Caught. It is believed that Pierce, Daniels, or whatever his name may be, is a decidedly clever swindler and just how many he got in Coos county is a problem. He has evidently covered every town in the county.

NO DONATIONS TO ELECTIONS

Corporations to Be Prohibited From Making Big Contributions Henceforth.

WASHINGTON, D. C., August 2. An entirely new bill based on Curberson's measure to forbid corporation contributions to an election at which a president, senator or representative is to be voted for and making it unlawful for any person or other than a candidate to contribute more than \$5,000 to such election was prepared today and will be recommended to the senate by a committee on privileges and elections.

PRINT TRUST IS ATTACKED

Government Tries to Stop "Tainted News" Distribution in Ready-prints.

CHICAGO, Aug. 3.—With the filing of an agreed decree in a civil anti-trust suit against the Western Newspaper Union and the American Press Association, the Federal government today took an advanced step under the Sherman law to prevent what the Department of Justice regarded as the possibility of a combination to influence the thought of 60,000,000 readers of rural newspapers.

The decree is designed to end the bitter trade war between the various corporations which furnish the "boiler plate" to thousands of country newspapers. The defendants are restrained from combining or continuing alleged unfair methods in competition which would result in destroying one or the other and a complete monopoly for the survivor with all its political power influencing the sentiments on economic and other important questions of readers of the sixteen thousand small newspapers in the United States which it is estimated go into the hands of two-thirds of the people of the country.

Repeal of Canadian Reciprocity Hitched on Ones Likely to Be Vetoed.

CONGRESS TO QUIT (By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—The leaders of both Houses said today that Congress could adjourn within a week or ten days if the Archibald impeachment were not set for immediate trial.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 3.—Some of President Taft's supporters in the Senate declared today that they had information that the president would veto every one of the tariff bills now under consideration.

"I have been informed," said Senator Simmons, "that the president will veto these tariff bills and I have no doubt that the word has already been sent to the Iron and Steel manufacturers that the proposed reduction will not go into the law."

The House agreed today to the conference report on the wool tariff revision by a vote of 160 to 62, only one democrat, Ashbrook of Ohio voting against the adoption while 24 republicans joined with the democrats in the affirmative vote.

By a vote of 33 to 28 the Senate today agreed to recede from its Canadian reciprocity appeal to the government on the steel bill. This leaves the bill approved by both houses. It will go to the president at once.
