Play Coquille—The North Bend baseball team will go to Coquille tomorrow in autos to play off the contested game which was thrown out by President Baxter. The North Bend team will put up the strongest front it has ever put up tomorrow and are confident of winning.

Teachers' Institute—The Annual Coos County Teachers' Institute will open Tuesday at Bandon for a two weeks' session with Mr. Melendy, Prof. Ball and Miss Shearer as instructor. Among the Marshfield teachers who will attend are Mr. Tiedgen and Mrs. P. M. Wilbur.

Fined Today—Phillip Fourler was haled before City Recorder Butler today and fined \$5 for allowing his calves to run at large in West Marshfield. The calves have been grazing in Friedberg's pasture but have been breaking out daily, causing damage to nearby lawns and much bother for Marshal Carter.

JONES HEARS ABOUT CASE

Charges Against Washington Real Estate Man Are Dropped.

E. B. Jones, a real estate man from Granger, Wash., who was arrested here this week on telegraphic advices from Sheriff Day of North Yakima, Wash., that he held a warrant for him charging obtaining money under false pretenses received word today that the charges had been dismissed. Mr. Jones was released from the county jail the night before last. Yesterday he wired Sheriff Day to ascertain the nature of the case against him and who instituted it. He received an answer today that A. E. Cooper had sworn out the warrant but that the case had later been dismissed.

Mr. Jones this afternoon had the following statement furnished to The Times relative to the matter:

"Mr. Jones states that so far as known to him he had no dealings with any person by the name of A. E. Cooper, but that he did negotiate a note given to him in a business transaction by one Joe Cooper. He concludes that A. E. Cooper is probably a relative of Joe Cooper and that some dissatisfaction on the part of these people was the cause of this hasty action, although the transaction was absolutely fair and legitimate, and was entered into at the solicitation of Cooper and was consummated on terms altogether satisfactory to him at the time.

"Mr. Jones said that while he had no complaint to make of the officers here for making the arrest on information sent them he cannot understand how it was that certain persons knew for some time in advance that his arrest was contemplated by the sheriff of Coos county, and were acquainted with the charge upon which the arrest was to be made. He states that he has been advised that the sheriff here could have secured a warrant from the local magistrate, or that he might have required the sheriff at North Yakima to cause the warrant to be telegraphed.

"He further complains of his treatment here in that his request to be taken before a magistrate for the purpose of being admitted to bail, though repeatedly made to the officer in whose custody he was, was wholly ignored and he was forced to remain in jail over night without being permitted to see an attorney or communicate with his friends or the Master of the Masonic Lodge as requested by him. He states that his attorney advises him that he was entitled to the privilege of being taken forthwith before a magistrate for the purpose of securing bail, and that he was entitled to the further privilege of having an attorney called in to see him, and he cannot understand why the local sheriff's office denied him these privileges."

He says that the man who started the report that he is interested with J. H. Somers or anybody else in promoting an electric railway is a full-fledged member of the Ananias Club and that his only interest in any railroad is to hasten the date on which Coos Bay will secure railway facilities.
