

## JOS. LOBRIERE DIES IN EAST

Former Coos Bay Resident Passes Away—Father of Mrs. H. A. Blake.

Mrs. H. H. Blake has received the sad word of the death of her father, Joseph Labriere, age 83 years, who passed away at his home at Fort Gage, Illinois, after a lingering illness. He was a pioneer of the Bay and lived on Coos River for many years with his family. He was well known on the Bay and had many friends here. He left the Bay 18 years ago. He leaves a wife and two daughters, the latter being Mrs. Annie Blake of Coos county and Mrs. Jennie Norton of Washington.

### DIES AT LORANE

B. M. Marlow Passes Away Soon After Leaving Coos Bay

Word was received here today of the death of Bithel Monroe Marlow at Lorane, Oregon. Mr. Marlow left here a few weeks ago, hoping that the change in climate would benefit his health, he having been ailing for some time. Death was caused by neuralgia of the heart. During his residence here, Mr. Marlow lived on Alder avenue. He was thirty-four years, six months and seventeen days old. He married less than two years ago Mrs. Mary E. Steckman of Hyndman, Pa., at Coquille, Ore. The news of Mr. Marlow's death will be a sad shock to the many friends he made on the Bay and had no intimation that his sickness was liable to prove fatal so quickly.

## GOODRUM IN SAN FRANCISCO

Automobile Man Writes of the Good Roads and Cadillacs for 1913.
