#### Church Compiles Regulations for School Children's Industrial Fair.

W. L. Ore., Aug. 6.—County Board of Education has just completed the first annual school fair for Coos County which will be held September 27 at Marshfield in connection with the industrial fair.

Prizes are offered for almost every product of the soil, flowers, vegetables and grain, for live stock and also for canned products, needle-work, etc. Thus the children are afforded an opportunity for almost any field of endeavor which they may be inclined to pursue. Instead of the prizes are in money, the belief is that the children will appreciate an article which they can read more than they would the money.

The board has issued the following instructions regarding the fair: It will furnish a prize list to the exhibitor. Every child may enter as many articles as he or she desires. Every pupil shall make more than one article for each prize. Every boy and girl under 21 years of age in Coos county is eligible to enter these contests. Sewing, baking, canning and other articles must be done by the exhibitor. All other entries must be selected and arranged by the pupil making the exhibit.

There must be a statement accompanying each exhibit signed by the exhibitor or guardian of each child. The exhibit entered must be prepared by the exhibitor. Ship all exhibits to the Coos County Fair Association, Myrtle street, Marshfield, Oreg., as early as possible to reach the fair grounds before the 26th, nor earlier than the 24th of September. The Association will arrange for exhibits without cost to the exhibitor.

In addition to the prizes in the fair, commodities offered in the following list, Mr. Maris writes that a three year subscription to a journal will be given to every boy or girl winning either a 1st, 2nd or 3rd prize in this contest. #### TO PROTECT BIRDS.

#### Audubon Society Plans to Aid in Protection in Oregon.

PORTLAND, Oregon, Aug. 8.—T. Gilbert Pearson, secretary of the National Association of Audubon Societies, has just arrived in Portland, coming direct from New York City. The object of his visit is to assist in the work of the Oregon Audubon society and aid the state board of fish and game commissioners in securing wider interest in bird and animal protection. Mr. Pearson is a writer of ability. His book, "Stories of Bird Life," has had wide circulation, especially in school work. He is also president of the national association of game wardens and commissioners which meets in Denver August 30th.

"Song and insectivorous birds as well as game birds and animals of Oregon must be provided with special refuges and retreats where they cannot be pursued and killed," said Mr. Pearson. "There are plenty of lakes, shore lines, rough mountain regions and other waste places that are of no use for agriculture where these creatures will thrive and increase if protected. The Audubon society is investigating and seeking out these places with the idea of getting them stocked with birds that will protect our fields and forests from the ravages of insect pests.

"Oregon is fortunate in having four of the largest and best wild bird reservations in the United States," continued Mr. Pearson. "Under the fish and game commission other refuges on private lands are being established in various parts of the state. It is very urgent that two or three large reserves be created for the protection of mountain sheep, elk, antelope and mule deer, which are rapidly approaching the point of final disappearance in this state."

#### TOOTH IS 200,000 YEARS OLD

#### That of Shark Was Found Imbedded in the Earth

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 7.—Excavators at work on the foundation of a big department store yesterday found a shark's tooth imbedded in the earth. These deposits have been declared by geologists to have formed the bottom of ocean 200,000 years ago. The tooth found yesterday bore the blue tinge found in the shark's teeth taken from the deposits at Charleston, S. C.
