**Liljequist Returns**—Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Liljequist and his wife returned to Coquille yesterday after an extended summer sojourn at his old home in Wisconsin, and visiting other points of interest in the West.

**Rushing Work**—The Federal Construction company is rushing its street work and expects to soon have things in readiness for laying pavement. Equipment and material for the paving were brought in on the last Redondo.

**Coming Back**—The Margaret Iles company which has played this section for several seasons is at Port Orford for the Agate Carnival this week. They are en route north from a tour of California and are expected to make the Coos county circuit soon.

**After Deer**—Tom Coke and Will Lawhorn left early today for the North Coos River country where they will spend a week or ten days in quest of deer. If they fill all the advance orders for venison, they will have to stop and build a railroad to transport the meat in.

**Will Open Camp**—It is announced that the Simpson Lumber Company's logging camp at Tarheel Point, which has been closed down for several weeks, will be reopened next Monday. Emmett Pierce of Marshfield will be foreman. It is expected that the camp will be operated steadily from now on.

**Secure Contract**—Small & Morrissey have been awarded the contract for paving seven blocks of the main streets of Myrtle Point with concrete paving. Two blocks will be covered with bitumen surfacing. The contract was awarded by the council Tuesday evening and work will be commenced as soon as possible.

**Is Sustained**—The Oregon Supreme court has just handed down a decision sustaining Judge Coke's decision in the Klamath Falls court-house case. The case was presented to Judge Coke while he was holding court there for Judge Benson last spring and attracted much attention. The sustaining of the decision of Judge Coke is quite an honor to the Marshfield jurist.

**Heavy Travel**—J. E. Schilling, who is now "Mine Host" of the Guerin hotel in Myrtle Point is in the city on business. He reports unusually heavy travel on the Myrtle Point-Roseburg stage line. Tuesday the auto brought in twenty-five people and another large delegation yesterday. As a result the hotel business is booming and Joe is correspondingly pleasant and prosperous.

The concrete is all mixed at the base of the tower and is carried to the top by an elevator. There the elevator dumps it into a pipe which can be put in any position desired and the concrete dumped just where it is wanted.
