President Turns Down Proposed Revision of Schedule K by Congress.

SAYS BILL DESTROYS INDUSTRY PROTECTION

Steel Bill, Cotton Bill, Sugar Bill and Excise Bill to Get Axe Also.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times).

WASHINGTON, D. C., August 9 .-For the second time within a year, President Taft today vetoed the bill to revise the wool tariff schedule "K" of the Payne-Aldrich law. President returned to Congress the bill evolved as a compromise between the House and the Senate, holding that the low rates provided in it would bring disaster to home indus-try. He appealed to Congress, however, not to adjourn until it had en-acted a measure to substantally reunnecessary existing duties without destroying the protection for the wool industry in the United States."

The President's disapproval of the wool bill is to be followed by similar vetoes of the steel bill and cotton The sugar bill is likely to be vetoed as is the excise tax bill, the latter probably on the ground that the President believes it unconstitutional.

Unlike the veto of the bill a year ago which is identical with the vetoed today, the president assigns a different reason. He vetoed the former because it was framed before the tariff board made its report. He vetoed the present bill because it was framed in disregard for the board's findings. President Taft reiterates his support of reduced tariffs but only in case the protective tariff system shall be main-
