ROAD WORK IS ORDERED DONE

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS INSPECT HIGHWAYS AT TEN MILE — IMPROVEMENTS ON COQUILLE-MARSHFIELD ROAD. Judge John F. Hall and County Commissioners Dement and Armstrong returned today from an inspection of the road work in the Ten Mile country. They ordered the construction of the new road around Saunders Lake to be hastened and also instructed the road supervisor in the district by the Waller place to hasten that construction.

The commissioners after an inspection ordered the bridge at Coalgo to be strengthened. Among the other work ordered at the special session at Coquille this week was considerable on the Marshfield-Coquille road. The principal part of this will be near the McQuigg place where by making a long fill, the road can be shortened a quarter of a mile and many steep grades and curves eliminated.
