

THE PROGRESSIVE CONVENTION.

A RECENT news report from Chicago contains the following:

"The new Progressive Party is now fully launched in its attempt to overthrow both the Republican and Democratic parties.

"It is not the first time the central west has been the center of political revolution. Politicians recall the scenes of 1856, when Wisconsin and Michigan led the fight which resulted in the formation of the Republican party and the overthrow of the Whigs and Free Soilers.

"Chicago in 1860 was the scene of the convention which nominated Abraham Lincoln as a Republican and he was the first to lead the new party to victory. The nomination took place in a wooden shack called the 'Wigwam' in Grant Park, the tract across from Orchestra hall, where Roosevelt made his new party declaration and was given a preliminary nomination after the Republican National convention had failed to make him its choice."

The story of the formation of the Republican party would be interesting reading at this time. Gen. John C. Fremont, who made the first report as to the feasibility of constructing a railroad across the Rocky mountains, was the candidate nominated. The campaign was hard fought and James Buchanan, of Pennsylvania, was put up by the Democratic party and as history tells us, was unfortunately elected, as during his administration the rebellion was commenced, but he was the last Democrat to be elected for a period of 28 years, when the people wanted a change and got Grover Cleveland, and before they were entirely through with him the philanthropic people inaugurated soup-houses throughout the country for the benefit of laboring men and their families who were out of employment. Should Woodrow Wilson be elected it is to be hoped that he will be an exception to the Democratic presidents who have preceded him.

It is generally conceded that Mr. Taft is not a sure winner this time, and yet he would be more acceptable to the country than a representative of democracy. It begins to look very much as if the progressive movement is to result in the formation of a party which will sweep the country. Already many states are conceded to the new party. Quoting again from the article first mentioned we have some important information which will be read with interest."

"The leaders are expecting thousands to flock to the city to attend the new party's birth. Its historical aspects will prove a lure, inasmuch as progressives are declaring the new party has come to stay and will be the master of the old line parties before another four years have rolled around.

"Colonel Roosevelt's personal participation in the convention also will be a magnet. He will be on the convention floor at all sessions, directing the work of organization, and will make a speech intended to undo all previous efforts. Progressives say it will be a bitter indictment of the Republican party, the body politic which elected him to the presidential chair, but which two months ago refused him what he claims to have been a rightful nomination.

"Instead of being a gathering of Republicans only, the new party convention will be constituted of men of all political beliefs. Republicans will lock arms with Democrats as the Whigs and Free Soilers embraced each other in 1856. The issues this time will be different, of course, as no war cloud, as then, hangs over the nation.

"Instead of slavery and state sovereignty problems, this convention will be fought on the issues of 'self-government, as against the boss' and 'let the people rule' is the slogan. In 1856 the battle cry was 'free soil, free speech, free men and Fremont.'"

"A different scene will greet the new political revolutionists from that which surrounded the famous Wigwam convention in 1860. Instead of meeting in a temporary shack on the lake front, the delegates will convene in a big stone hall—the Coliseum—seating 12,000 people and fitted out with the latest in the way of modern conveniences.

"Another thing which the 1856 and 1860 conventions did not countenance was women sitting as delegates. This time women will come from California and other states where woman has been enfranchised and take part in the active deliberations. Not only that, but reform has it that a suffrage plank will be in the new party platform.
