Last year Dr. Schenck made his first visit here with his students and the work in this locality has been made a regular part of the school year.

The students will hold their classes in the Marshfield central school and will make this city their headquarters. They will visit the different logging camps in the county and study the methods of the loggers and the timber resources of the county.

DISCUSS CANAL BILL

President Wants Resolution Introduced in House (By Associated Press to The Coos Bay Times)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 19.—President Taft today began the task of convincing the members of the House and Senate that the Panama Canal bill should contain some feature to convince other nations that United States did not intend to violate the Hay-Pauncefote treaty. He gave a resolution to Representative Shirley drawn to insure the right of any foreign ship owner to have a free tolls provision passed on by the United States courts. Some members think the bill already provides for that but the resolution of the president submitted specifically provides for it. Shirley said he will submit the resolution to the House, and Senate conferees on the bill and learn if they are willing to have it presented to Congress.
