

HEATHER IN PORT TODAY

Lighthouse Tender Here to Repair Spar Buoys and Deliver Supplies.

The lighthouse tender Heather, Capt. Hammerstrom, is in port today and docked at Marshfield. The tender is here to make some improvements in the aids to navigation. Two of the spar buoys in the lower bay were taken up and will be scraped and repainted and placed again. The tender also has some oil and other supplies for the Cape Arago lighthouse. The Heather presents her usual neat and trim appearance and attracted a good deal of attention while at the dock.

ALONG THE WATERFRONT.

The steamer Fifeid arrived in port today at Bandon bringing passengers and freight from San Francisco.

The Hugh Hogan which has been loading lumber on the Coquille river sailed from Bandon today.

The steamer Nann Smith arrived in port this afternoon and will load lumber at the Smith mill.

The steamer Washington was due here today from San Francisco but had not yet arrived this afternoon.

Contest Over Hotel.—Harry Wilkins and Hillis Short of Ten Mile are in litigation over the Lakeside hotel. Wilkins claims to own it alone, while Short, who has been conducting the hotel, claims a partnership interest. Wilkins wants to eject Short and sell the place to Chas. Thom for \$2500. Some evidence was taken in the case yesterday.

Hearing Not Set.—The time for the hearing on the injunction suit against the Terminal railroad has not yet been set. Judge Coke said that he would hear it any time the lawyers were ready but so far no date has been set for the arguments. The injunction affects only the work of the road in the north part of the city. The company is going on with the work on Front street and is now taking up the paving between Central and Commercial preparatory to the track laying.

FIGHT BATTLE OF WORDS

Members of Congress Have Lively Session Today.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 20.—Representative Rainey of Illinois Democrat, and Representative Austin, Tennessee, Republican fought a wordy battle in the house today and exchanged bitter personalities. Each had 54 minutes allotted under the special rule. Rainey charged Austin with being personally interested in the water power legislation. In a recent speech Rainey said Austin had declared that if he (Austin) as representative had favored the "waterpower trust," and if Rainey could prove it, Austin would resign. Rainey said he did not want Austin to resign. He said the cause of water-power conservation in Tennessee would suffer if he did. Then he went on to state that the records showed that Austin was one of the incorporators of the Knoxville Power company, and that later Austin and others gave an option on the company to the Aluminum Company of America and that the option was accepted. He said that the aluminum company was closely allied with the General Electric company. Austin sprang to his feet immediately at the close of Rainey's speech and replied in intense bitterness. He referred to Rainey's indictment of Charles P. Taft in connection with the Panama canal acquisition and declared that these charges had not been proven. "And the gentleman from Illinois," he added, "was unmanly enough not to retract his slanders."
