TELLS ABOUT INFECTED FRUIT

P. M. HALL - LEWIS GIVES INSTRUCTIONS REGARDING MARKETING OF APPLE CROP.

Editor Times:— P. M. Hall-Lewis in the following letter makes clear how the fruit growers of Coos county may market satisfactorily their infected fruit.

You, as a consumer, when refusing to do so become a poor "booster" for Coos county and likewise utterly fail to take into account a necessary feature to your own welfare.

All fruit dealers and consumers are hereby requested to read carefully these simple instructions and make known to all fruit growers how they may safely employ these methods.

Replying to your favor of 12th inst. will say that fruit treated in such manner as to destroy infection thereon, is not considered by this office "a public nuisance." Care should be exercised that the instructions for treatment of infected fruit be substantially followed.

SMITH-POWERS COMPANY PLANNING ACTUAL CONSTRUCTION ON ROAD FROM MYRTLE POINT

GET RIGHT-OF-WAY

The Southern Pacific yesterday closed negotiations for the purchase of right of way through Steamboat Addition to Yarrow, West of old North Bend.

That the Smith-Powers company will soon start construction on the logging road from Myrtle Point is the word brought here today by parties from Myrtle Point.

F. A. Warner, assistant to C. A. Smith, has been on the ground for a few days and visited Myrtle Point yesterday. It is understood that his visit here is in relation to contracts for the road.

A. H. Powers is said to be desirous of building much of the line himself and probably will do so.

While the Smith company and the Southern Pacific have not yet entered an agreement regarding the handling of the traffic from the Smith-Powers logging road between Myrtle Point and Marshfield over the line of the Southern Pacific, it is understood that they are close enough together to insure the contract being made. This will eliminate the necessity of the Smith-Powers people building a parallel track between Myrtle Point and Marshfield.

A SWIFT PASSAGE

Wind Jammer Makes Record Trip from Oregon to South Africa SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 21—What is considered a rattling passage for a windjammer has just been completed by the British ship Crown of India, Cape Town, South Africa, August 2, after having been out but 82 days from the Columbia river. The average passage from the River to Cape Town ranges from 100 to 120 days. Under charter of Balfour, Guthrie & Co. the Crown of India loaded lumber at Portland from lighters alongside of the Alaska dock, a plan made necessary because of her inability to get under the span of the new steel bridge. She cleared with 1,751,437 feet of lumber valued at \$31,264.72. The ship got away from Portland on May 7, but it was May 12 before she crossed out to sea.

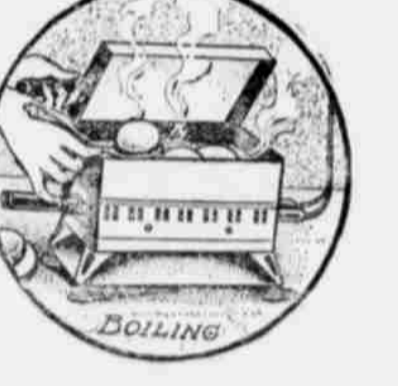
