Vessels with a tonnage of 499,000 are being built in English shipyards for foreign and colonel owers. If merchant vessels and warships are combined construction now under way foots up 2,277,100 tons.

It is stated that not only has the White Star Line decided to use oil fuel in the new 18,000-ton steamer now being built for the Australian trade, but that it is contemplating the construction of three more of these large liners of 675 feet length, 69 feet beam and loaded draught of 34 feet 6 inches.

According to steamship concerns operating coastwise, the freight and passenger traffic between San Francisco and southern ports is increasing so rapidly that the steamers now on the run are running with their entire passenger accomodations booked to the limit. If the increase is maintained during the next year, the addition of more steamers will be necessary to accomodate the demand.
