

# ENGINEER HOEY VISITING HERE

been arranged for was the big tunnel between Ten Mile and the Umpqua. This is known as Tunnel No. 7, the tunnels being numbered from the Eugene end.

However, he said that he expected to see things pretty active here next summer.

He said that just now the contractors were being impeded by the shortage of labor, the large amount of railroad work in Canada having attracted many laborers from the Pacific northwest. He said that this winter, they would have plenty of laborers. He said that the bulk of the heavy construction work could be carried on in the winter time as well as the summer, the clay work being the only kind that would be impeded by the rainy season. He said that the tunnel on this end was the only work that might delay, it being uncertain as to what they would strike in the big bore. The rest of the work on this end can be done quickly and it is unnecessary to tie up money in it until they get ready to use it, he said.

Mr. Hoey made a trip down over the Oregon Central and says that there is considerable heavy work to be done on that project. It is rather waiting on the Natron extension now. The road has been completed forty miles north from Klamath Falls.

**Other Surveyors**  
Mr. Hoey said that he did not know anything about Mr. Wolfram and the party of Southern Pacific engineers now working near Beaver Hill. He said they are working under instructions direct from Chief Engineer Hood.

As was announced in The Times two or three weeks ago when Mr. Wolfram and his party arrived here, they are working south from the Bay and many believe they will follow the old Brown survey down the coast. Nothing official has been given out concerning their plans, though.

Mr. Hoey said that he understood that some of the records and field notes of the old Brown survey might have been lost in the fire at San Francisco and suggested that perhaps Mr. Wolfram and his party were just renewing lost records.

Mr. Hoey in talking again today of his visit repeated his former statement that there was no railroad significance attached to his trip up the coast. He said that it was simply a pleasure trip for the purpose of informing himself regarding the country.
