### BANDON BRIEFS.

News of the City by the Sea Given in the Recorder.

Mrs. J. L. Kroneberg, Mrs. Fred Belloni and Misses Edna Galler and Edna Russell returned from the Fifield from San Francisco.

Mr. and Mrs. Cass, Warton and daughter and Frank Brown, brother of the district attorney, of Roseburg, are spending a few days in Bandon. They made the trip by auto.

The gasoline famine is still on in Bandon and the only hope of relief seems to be in the arrival of the schooner Oregon which has been out from San Francisco 14 days, but has not been sighted at this port as yet.

The Rackieff family who have been camping here for the past two weeks returned to Myrtle Point Saturday, with the exception of David and Sylvia, who remained to visit with their many friends for a few days.

Bandon is becoming a great camping ground for people from Roseburg and the surrounding country who own automobiles. During the past two weeks there have been several parties in from the valley and they declare that the trip is no where near as bad as some people make it out to be.

### EXPECT BIG MEN

Prominent Railroad Officials to Visit at Eugene

The Eugene Guard says:

"Oregon Electric circles have been all attention today over the prospective visit of President Jos. Young, accompanied by a party, among whom is President Elliott, of the Northern Pacific, of St. Paul, Minn., who is making a tour of the Willamette valley. Engineer Griswold said this morning that the only information which he had relative to the proposed visit was what he had learned through the newspapers. He had tried to find out through the Portland office, but had received no definite information. He assumed that they were taking a leisurely and careful view of the Willamette valley."

### WILL MOVE LANDMARK.

One of England's Oldest Taverns to Be Torn Down.

LONDON, Aug. 24. The hand of the builder has been laid upon one of England's oldest taverns, and soon the 500-year-old Castle Inn of Kingston will be a memory only. One of the first historical mentions of the inn is made in the curious old work known as "Valor Ecclesiasticus," published in 1558, which states that the Castle Inn paid a tithe of three shillings and four pence a year to the vicar of Kingston.

More than a century later the "Mirabilis Annus," sates that "Upon the first day of the assizes, being March 4, 1660, it pleased the Lord to strike with sudden death, as he was drinking a glass of wine in the Castle Tavern there, the Under Sherriffe of that county."

The Castle remained a favorite-hotel until 1840, when the growth of railway travel compelled it to close its doors. In the old days of the post chaise the inn was the first stage on the outward journey from London to the south of England. In addition to the post chaises, 21 passenger coaches changed horses there daily. The old carved oak staircase, dating from the Tudor times, has been preserved.

## CRUSADE ON "BLIND PIGS"

Douglas County Officials Arrest Liquor Law Violators

ROSEBURG, Ore., Aug. 24.—In line with the general cleanup which has been in progress in Douglas county for the past two months, several deputy sheriffs raided a number of "soft" drink emporiums at Glendale and confiscated several barrels of beer as well as a dozen or more bottles of whiskey. Those affected by the raid were Kinney & Hayes and Hayes, Coburn & McCloud.

The product confiscated from the resorts was shipped to Roseburg last night, and is being held at the sheriff's office awaiting the arrival of a chemist, who will analyze the beer. Most of the beer seized bears the labels of the Salem and Budweiser Brewing companies. The whiskey is said to be a standard product.

Owing to the fact that the persons affected by the raid are substantial property owners in the vicinity of Glendale, formal arrests of the accused proprietors will be delayed pending a report of the chemist.

Should the liquid be found to contain a percentage of alcohol in excess of the amount allowed by law the defendants will probably be tried during the special term of circuit court, which convenes on September 2.

### TO ORGANIZE CHURCH

Denominational Meetings at Myrtle Point and Bandon

Regarding the forming of a new church in Coos county the Myrtle Point Enterprise says:

"A convention of the Christian church of Coos county was held here last week and attended by about 100 delegates, including the ministers of that faith from the various towns of the county, the object of the conference being the advancement of the interests of the church in this county. The committee consisting of State Evangelist Wilson of Portland, Secretary C. F. Sander of Portland and three Coos county ministers, Deward of Marshfield, McDonald of Coquille, and Thornton, of this city, were named to visit Bandon next week to undertake the organization of a church and society here."

### VALUABLE BIRDS ARE SEEN

Inspector Reports Flock of 200 Snowy Egrets with \$20 Plumage

KLAMATH FALLS, Aug. 24.—The field inspector of bird reserves for the Pacific district is here. He reports a large black bear killed near Pelican Bay Lodge, also that two Klamath Falls hunters had secured deer. He says that the supply of deer is as large as in former years. On his recent trip through the eastern part of the state he found on the shores of Silver Lake at least 200 snowy egrets, the only colony of this bird which has been so nearly exterminated by hunters for the plumage.

These plumage sell readily at \$20 each. As they grow only during the mating season, that is the time they are killed. They are completely protected by law in this state now. The inspector also found two colonies of the glossy ibis or black curlew on Warner and Malheur Lakes. He says that heavy showers and a rise in the water destroyed about three-fourths of the young created grebes on Malheur Lake.

### DEER ARE INCREASING

MEDFORD, Ore., Aug. 24.—Deer are on the increase instead of the decrease. Such, at least, is the statement of Game Warden C. L. Springer who is a well known authority on all matters pertaining to game and wood lore.

Mr. Springer has just returned from a three weeks' trip at the head of Cow creek and on Evans creek. "Young deer are more plentiful this year than I ever saw them. Does too are found with great ease showing that the hunters of this section of the state are beginning to hold the game laws in high regard. The conditions this season to date have greatly improved. In very few instances have I found hunters without licenses and on no occasion have I found any who willfully violated any of the laws."

### OPPOSED TO BLACK BASS

Fish Warden Disapproves of Plan of Roseburg Men.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Aug. 24.—The proposal of Roseburg fishermen to plant black bass in the South Umpqua river is not favorably regarded by State Fish Warden R. E. Clanton. Mr. Clanton says the bass are gradually destroying every other species of fish, including carp and trout in the Willamette river and he thinks if a choice is to be made between bass and trout for the Umpqua river that the bass should be rejected.

He says he is not opposed to planting bass in the South Umpqua if that propagation can be confined to that river, but he sees at this time no way by which they could be prevented from inhabiting the North Umpqua also. Mr. Clanton will place the matter in the hands of the state fish commission for final determination.
