BIG TIMBER SALE

Booth-Kelly Company Sell \$1,000,000 Worth of Property.

The Eugene Guard says: The consideration of approximately \$1,000,000 it is stated on reliable authority that the Booth-Kelly company has disposed of some of its timber in this county to the Timber company. The deal has been understood, been pending for some time, and its consummation probably depended somewhat on the passage of congress in the immediate chaser's relief bill. About 100,000,000 feet of timber is said to be involved. At the Booth-Kelly office in this city today, the employees refused to either confirm or deny report and referred to Senator Booth on his return to the city next week.
