

CITY COUNCIL HOLDS MEETING

Anderson Avenue Accepted and Bonds Sold—Other Street Work Considered.

Street improvement work occupied the attention of the city council most of the time during the meeting last night. The improvement on Anderson avenue where the cedar blocks were laid was accepted and Hugh McLain, the contractor was ordered paid the balance due him. The total cost of the street was \$5,917.70 for the two blocks.

Hugh McLain was awarded the contract for the improvement of Fourth from Central avenue to Donnelly. The contract price was \$3,187, which includes sidewalks and the replacing of the bridge roadway which was condemned. Hugh McLain made a bid for \$2,231.27 improvement bonds for Anderson avenue. He bid for the bonds at par and they were awarded him.

The grading on Market avenue was accepted and the grading on Fourth was also accepted. This work done by Moon and Barkley. The contractors were ordered paid as far as the money was available, it not having been all collected.

The council passed an ordinance calling a special election for Sept. 30 at which time the people will vote on the proposition for the new charter amendments. The principal one of these is that which proposes to make the election laws of the city conform with the state election laws and to divide the city into wards.

An assessment was made for the improvement of Seventh street from Flanagan to a point 125 feet south of Golden. The assessment made was \$1.76 a front foot and \$275 for the intersection of Golden.

There was some discussion regarding the plan for a boulevard from Marshfield to the ocean. City Attorney Goss had at a previous meeting been asked to confer with the attorney for the Reynolds Development company for the purpose of making some kind of an agreement so that the offer of the company could be put in such form that it could be formally accepted by the city. One question which has arisen is in regard to the boulevard running through property which is to be platted. Mr. Goss suggested that if the strip of land was 200 feet wide and had a roadway in the center any property along the boulevard which was platted would be back some distance from the driveway. He wanted to know if it was the idea to have a driveway on each side of the 200 feet to reach the property or just how it was the intention to arrange it. No action was taken by the council.

NO CLUB FORMED

Equal Suffrage Movement Not Taken Up Here

The visit of Mrs. Colby, the equal suffrage speaker, to this city, did not result in the formation of an organization. Mrs. Colby as a speaker made quite a favorable impression and is spoken of by the ladies here who met her as being a highly cultured person but nothing was done in the way of organizing. It is not likely that any equal suffrage club will be formed in this city. Mrs. Colby left here for Portland and from that city will go to Kansas to help in the campaign for equal suffrage there. Clubs were formed by Mrs. Colby at both Coquille and Myrtle Point.

AGAINST SINGLE TAX
