AFTER CURRY LIQUOR MEN

Judge J. S. Coke Imposes Fines and Punishment in Several Cases Up.

Liquor men of Curry County were made to pay the expenses of this term of court and then some profit, after being punished for violations of the liquor laws.

Judge John S. Coke returned from Gold Beach today after having held a three-day session of the circuit court. He came back in the auto with Court Reporter Riddle. There were not many civil cases and only one civil case was tried before a jury.

O. P. Haageson, who conducts a saloon at Langlois, was up to answer several charges. There were two indictments against him for selling liquor to minors and one charge of allowing gambling in his place. He holds a regular license in Langlois. On the charge of allowing gambling and on one of the charges of selling to minors he was fined \$200 and costs in each case. On the other charge of selling liquor to minors he was fined \$300 and costs and sentenced to one year in jail but was paroled on the conditions that he conduct his business in a law abiding manner.

Another saloon man up was Peter Johnson, who had a license to sell liquor at Langlois. He was charged with selling liquor to minors. He was fined \$200 and costs. He paid up and said that he would quit the business and go back to ranching.

There was also an indictment against a man named Owen who conducted a saloon at Gold Beach. The place burned down and since then Owen secured a government license to dispose of his liquor in quantities of a gallon or more. The state law does not permit of gallon selling any more, although the man had a government license. The grand jury recommended that they believed that the man thought he was working legally and therefore asked that the court give him consideration. He was fined \$400 and paroled on account of the request of the grand jury.

The cases of Bert Hill and Carl Tilton, charged with statutory crime, were continued, owing chiefly to the fact that one of the chief witnesses is ill.

Court in Coos.

Judge Coke will next Tuesday open an adjourned term of the circuit court in Coos county. The regular term will begin Sept. 9. There are 200 civil cases on the docket and quite a number of criminal cases, including at least one murder case.
