**WILL CONSIDER STRAW'S PLAN**

William Grimes to Call Mass Meeting for Discussion of Boulevard Scheme.

William Grimes, chairman of the executive committee of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce will call a mass meeting soon of the members of the North Bend and Marshfield Chambers of Commerce and the business men generally for the purpose of considering Mayor Straw's plan for a boulevard from Marshfield to the sea. Mr. Grimes considers that this is a very important matter and should be considered by everyone interested.

"Just as soon as the Shriners big doings are over, I think we ought to take up the boulevard plan which Mayor Straw has been working on and push it through," said Mr. Grimes today. "Next to the Port of Coos Bay, I think it is one of the most important matters for the community. A mecadam road, or something similar is what we should have."

**NEW CITY HALL**

Coquille Will Borrow \$8,000 for the Purpose.

Coquille is to have a new city hall and has taken the steps necessary to raise the money. At the last meeting of the council there was passed an ordinance which authorizes the council to borrow \$8,000 for municipal purposes. It is provided that this money may be borrowed on warrants numbered from 1 to 16 and of a denomination of \$500 each, bearing 6 per cent interest and payable two each in their order every year until all are paid, the money to be used for the purpose of building the city hall.
