

# BISHOP HERE FROM PORTLAND

#### The Rt. Rev. Charles Scadding of Episcopal Church Interviewed.

The Rt. Rev. Charles Scadding, D. D., Bishop of Oregon, arrived on the Steamer Breakwater on Thursday. 'We had a delightful trip," said the bishop, "the Breakwater is fast, has comfortable and clean staterooms and berths and serves excellent meals and is commanded by one who is not only an able seaman but a genial gentleman with a remarkable verbal memory. I did not know Oregon possessed a poet who can take the facts of ancient history, laud battles and sea fights, and throw them into such inspiring verse. He may be a bit short on religious poetry but I imagine he can supply this on the trip back. All Oregon is proud of Capt, Macgenn and if the ship is ever in danger at sea it will be a relief to know that he is on the bridge."

Bishop Scadding spent yesterday in visiting many members of the Episcopal church and expressed pleasure and surprise at the many improvements in the streets and city generally since his visit a year ago. He will preach at Emmanuel church at 11 a. m. and 7:30 p. m. tomorrow night and will leave for Bandon and Coquille on Monday returning to Marshfield for his official visitation and confirmation on Sunday 15th. Seats are free and strangers will receive a cordial weclome.

Bishop Scadding came directly to Marshfield from Eastern Oregon where he attended the convention of the Central Oregon Development League at Lakeview. In company with President Kerr of the Agricultural college, Bill Hawiey of Burns, C. C. Chapman, Secretary of the Portland Commercial Club, and other business men of Portland, Bishop Scadding went by motor car from The Dalles to Prineville, Lakeview, Klamath Falls and Bend and at all the small towns the party was received by representative and local Commercial Clubs, and many good speeches The best advertisement Oregon can have," said Bishop Scadding, "is a well developed, prosperous state, and agriculture is the greatest factor in development. I was greatly impressed with two things evident in our inland en pire-the growing spirit of cooperation among the ranchers, and small towns, the expressed desire to stop all "knocking" and to get together and pull together for the good of all. No state needs this more than Oregon at the present time, and the church needs it as well as the state. The second thing that impressed me was the courage of the people a the sage brush land. It requires determination, doggedness and hard work to take a section of sage brush country and make it raise crops. This our people in Eastern Oregon have done by dry farming; and of course where it is possible to get water on that volcanic ash, alfalfa and other crops are Service Sunday at 11 a. m. large.
