### DANCES

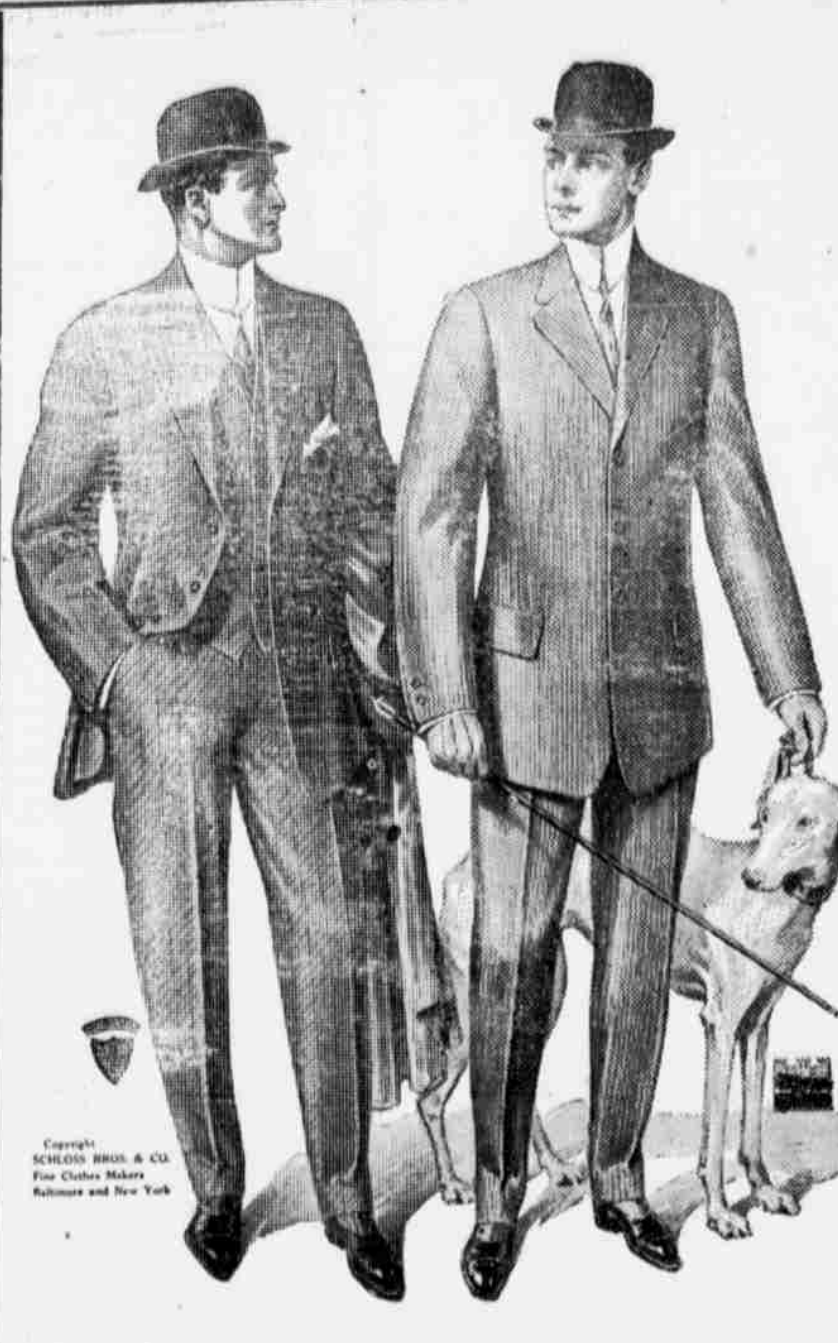

## ORPHEUM HAS NOTED PEOPLE

MARSHFIELD'S POPULAR PLAYHOUSE SECURES FORMER MEMBERS OF THE "SIS" HOPKINS COMPANY FOR MUSICAL ATTRACTION.

Manager Keller, of the Orpheum, Marshfield's popular playhouse, has just added another feature that is adding to the popularity of the theater. He has arranged with Mr. and Mrs. E. R. Lewis, direct from New York City and formerly with the famous Rose Melville "Sis Hopkins" company to take charge of the music in the Orpheum. Mr. Lewis is a talented pianist and Mrs. Lewis a vocalist of rare ability. They have brought the latest eastern song hits with them for their engagement at the Orpheum.

They are both well known in the east and have been connected with some of the best theatrical companies, including Klak & Erlanger's "Beauty and the Beast," which ran two years at the New Amsterdam theater; Fisher & Ryley, of Florama fame, whose comic opera company Mr. Lewis was the musical director of during a whole summer run at Young's Pier, Atlantic City; the companies of Geo. H. Broadhurst, who wrote "The Man of The Hour," "What Happened to Jones," etc. Mr. Lewis was also, for two years, connected with the John Church Music Co., Cincinnati, in the capacity of arranger of orchestral and band music, songs, etc. He is well known as a composer of theatrical music, having written the music for several of the Broadhurst plays, the "Sis Hopkins" music, besides a comic opera, several burlesques, songs, orchestral compositions, etc.

Mr. Lewis is here in the interest of these people and as he wanted to remain some time in order to look over the ground thoroughly, he hunted up Mr. Keller of whom he knew. Mr. Keller, with his usual business foresight immediately made arrangements to have the professional services of these people while they were here. Both Mr. and Mrs. Lewis declare they like Marshfield very much, and that it is their intention to make a permanent home here.

## MOTOR PARTY RETURNS HOME

GEORGE GOODRUM, DR. AND MRS. HORSFALL AND MISS WILLIAMS END 5000-MILE TOUR.

After enjoying a 5000-mile auto trip through California and Oregon, George Goodrum, Dr. and Mrs. Wm. Horsfall, Jr., and Miss Frances Williams arrived home last night. Mrs. Marion Russell, a friend of Mr. Goodrum's made most of the trip with them. Although tired after the long journey, which lasted just a month, they are enthusiastic over the motor trip.

The party started from San Francisco in Mr. Goodrum's Cadillac, made the run down to Los Angeles by the Coast route, stopping at Santa Cruz, Paso Robles, Monterey, Santa Barbara and other points of interest and the resorts. From Los Angeles they made many side trips to Ocean Park, Long Beach, Venice, etc. From San Diego they went to Tin Juana where they saw a bull fight. Returning north from Los Angeles they took the interior route by Bakersfield, Madera Fresno and the San Joaquin Valley. They then went to the Yosemite valley and left the machine at Wawona and staged it out to see the famous big trees at Mariposa. They also took a mule ride of 15 miles to Glacier Point. They returned to Merced, Stockton and Sacramento and then proceeded to Reno, Nev., thence to Lake Tehoc, Truckee and Donna Lake. They returned via Grass Valley, Marysville, Red Bluff, Shasta Springs, Medford, Ashland and Roseburg.

"In our 5000-mile journey we only had two punctures," said Mr. Goodrum today. "Both were in the right front wheel. The other tires came back with the same air in them that we pumped in here before we started. We did not have to make a single repair and did not have a breakdown. We used 358 gallons of gasoline on the trip and nine gallons of cylinder oil."

"The Coast route to Los Angeles and the roads out of there are like boulevards but the rest of the trip was over some of the worst mountain roads in the country, the grades in some places being as high as thirty-seven per cent. Our Cadillac has a load of 1,100 pounds on the journey."
