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ALMOST HALF A BILLION TONS OF COAL IN U. S.

THE United States has become a half billion ton coal country. During the last two years the total production has averaged just a trifle short of the 500,000,000 mark, exceeding that figure in 1910 and almost reaching it in 1911. It is considered probable that in the future it will be a bad year whose production falls far short of this quantity. The final figures show a total production in 1911 of 496,182,298 short tons, valued at the mines at \$625,910,113. Of this production Pennsylvania anthracite amounted to 90,464,067 short tons, valued at \$174,952,415, and bituminous coal at \$450,957,698. The decrease in production in 1911 was 5,498,070 tons, or a little over 1 per cent, in quantity, and \$3,646,998, or a little over 0.5 per cent in value.

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MAJOR MORROW GETS NEW JOB

Is Appointed Head of Alaskan Railroad Commission and Will Leave Soon.

Major Morrow, in charge of the government engineering office at Portland and with whom this locality has transacted business at different times, has a new appointment. The Portland Telegram of Saturday says:

Major Jay J. Morrow, corps of engineers, U. S. A., was surprised yesterday by receipt of news from Washington that he has been appointed by President Taft as chairman of the Alaskan Railroad Commission, authorized shortly before the adjournment of Congress to conduct surveys and make estimates of the cost of construction of railroads from the seaboard to the Alaska coal fields and to interior points of the territory. It will mark the first real progressive step ever taken by the government toward the development of the natural resources of Alaska.

It is probable the commission will leave the Sound for the north about September 8 or 9 on the revenue cutter Takoma. Their work will keep them in Alaska about three months.

Major Morrow has been stationed at Portland about two years and in charge of the river and harbor improvements in the First District, comprising the Oregon coast, the upper Columbia and Snake rivers, including the Dalles-Celilo canal project, and the upper Willamette River. His appointment as head of the commission is a signal honor which came to him wholly unexpectedly. During his absence the affairs of his district will be looked after by Captain H. H. Robert, who has been stationed here at Big Eddy.
