AUGUST IS WET MONTH

Rainfall During Past Thirty Days Unusually Large for This Season.

August this year has been an unusually month of rainfall. The total rainfall during August this year was 1.64 inches while during August of 1911 only .19 of an inch fell. The total rainfall since last Friday to date was 1.72 inches which is extremely great for this time of the year. The total rainfall from Sept. 1, 1911, to Aug. 31, 1912, the past twelve months, was 62.87 inches.

RAIN RECORD BROKEN

Greatest Precipitation in Portland in August in Years.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 2.—Breaking all records for rainfall in Portland during the month of August by .13 inches, the amount of precipitation for the month up to noon Friday was 2.63 inches. Prior to this year the greatest amount of rain ever known during August was in 1899, when there was 2.50 inches, that being the record for that month, since the weather bureau was established here 41 years ago.
