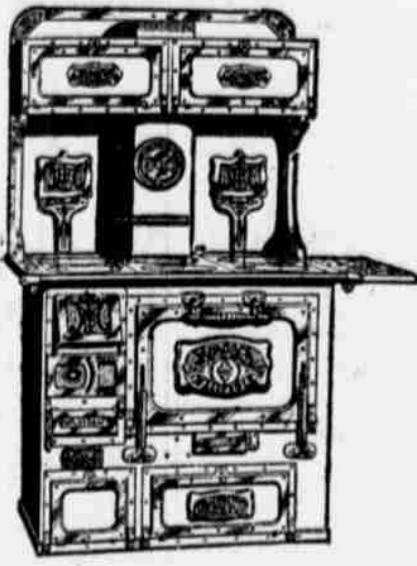

JOYNER RUMOR UNTRUE Body Not Found Yesterday—Parents Located in Georgia

Another report was in circulation yesterday that the body of William Joyner, the missing South Inlet rancher, had been found in the woods. However it was untrue. Emmett Pierce, who was up from Tarheel camp yesterday, reports that several boats have been dragging the lower bay daily in quest of Joyner's body, the offer of \$700 reward by the county, state and Sheriff Gage spurring them on. All efforts have been futile, not even a trace being found.

Marshal Carter has located Joyner's father, A. W. Joyner, near Savannah, Ga. Joyner's mother is still alive. They have long lived near Savannah and will send details concerning their son in hopes of aiding in the solution of the mystery of his disappearance. Bill Joyner served in the Philippines in the United States army during the Spanish-American war and also served as a special officer on the Georgia Central railway for a time.
