here with the party from that city is the president of the Medford Chamber of Commerce, an organization which has done a wonderful work in boosting that part of Jackson county.
Leon Haskins, another of the Medford party, is a druggist of that city. E. N. Warner of Medford is a groceryman of that city and is a member of the firm of Warner, Wortman & Gore.
L. L. Mullt, of Ashland, is another of the bankers who are here. He is cashier of the First National Bank of Ashland.
Robert E. Smith who is with the First Trust and Savings company of Roseburg, has the distinction of being the only one of the party who tackled the road from that city to Marshfield on a motorcycle. He is a master at riding a motorcycle but on this occasion did not get here on the machine on which he started. The motorcycle is somewhere over in Camas Valley. There is some variation in the stories of how it happened. Mr. Smith says he has abandoned his machine because he met some friends who could not drive their auto but these same friends say that they picked him up when he was nearly wrecked. However, Mr. Smith deserves considerable distinction for coming as far as he did over such roads for there were no desert sands, it was just mere mud and lots of it.
C. H. Vaupel, one of the Ashland party and assistant recorder of Hillah Temple, in speaking of the roads between Roseburg and Coos Bay said: "There are no roads from Roseburg. We brought them all with us on our autos. We simply peeled them up in layers and rolled them around our machines. There may be a few left but most of the roads we brought to this city."
Many of the visitors from the southern part of the state are talking of going back by way of Crescent City, Cal. Their idea is to go to Bandon and down the coast through Curry county to Crescent City and up from that place to Grants Pass. They will investigate the road conditions and if they are reported to be any better than the Roseburg road they will make the trip home that way.
Some of the visitors call attention to the fact that it is something of a coincidence that the Ford machines which started all got here while some of the other machines did not succeed in making the trip successfully.
Hon. E. B. Carter, who is with the Ashland party, is a retired banker and a capitalist. His brother, F. H. Carter, is also here but the latter is a resident of Eugene.
Alex McLeod of Ashland is the oldest Shriner here in point of years but he is one of the Scotchmen whose years are not as long as many measure time. He is about seventy and "crossed the burning sands" about eight years ago and never misses an opportunity to participate in a pilgrimage.
Col. Reeder, of Ashland, is one of the interesting visitors. He lived in Illinois many years ago and came to Oregon from Kansas. From the latter state he was one of the representatives in Congress and was associated with many of the prominent congressmen. Col. Reeder thinks that Oregon is a great state and talks in a most interesting manner of the possibilities of Oregon and of the development that is to be carried on here.
M. E. Cyester, of Ashland, is one of the fruit growers of that locality. He has an orchard of 22 acres which is in high state of cultivation and known as the Diamond C orchard. Mr. Cyester raises apples, pears, cherries and peaches. He is enthusiastic about the Ashland country as a fruit growing district and says that all of the orchards there are cultivated to the highest point and that it is one of the best places for growing the big red apples that have made Oregon famous. Mr. Cyester said that he ate an apple produced in the Coquille valley and that he found it to be a fine one. He thought that Coos county ought to be a good fruit growing district but said that he did not notice the high cultivation of orchards which characterizes the parts of the state which are the best producers.
The clam bake tomorrow at the beach promises to be a great occasion. Many of the visitors say that they have never attended a clam bake as they have lived in the interior and they look forward to the event with much interest.
Some of the Shriners are planning to motor home by the coast route that is via Bandon, Gold Beach and Crescent City.

LARGE CROWDS HEAR SHIELDS

MUCH INTEREST MANIFESTED IN DISCUSSION OF SINGLE TAX QUESTION — PORTLAND MAN SAYS IT MEANS CONFISCATION.

Every indication points to a series of most enthusiastic meetings for Charles H. Shields, secretary of the Oregon Equal Taxation League, who arrived in Bandon for a couple of days' stay with his brother last week.
Mr. Shields is engaged in a series of meetings in the larger cities of Coos county, his dates being as follows:
Coquille Monday, September 2.
Bandon, Tuesday, September 3.
Myrtle Point, Wednesday, Sept. 3.
Marshfield, Thursday, Sept. 5.
North Bend, Friday, September 6.
It is the intention of Mr. Shields, he says, to expose Single Tax in all its forms from the measure proposed in Coos county to the graduated measure offered over the state at large.
"If you want complete confiscation of the land, then turn to Graduated Single Tax," declared Mr. Shields.
"My opponents say that Graduated Single Tax will not permit of confiscation by the state. It will, Henry George, the author and advocate of Single Tax, himself declares that state ownership of the land is the only resource and desires to have Single Tax bring about that end. As Mr. U'Ren declares that the measures offered are single tax pure and simple, there seems no reasonable doubt of the end in view. It might be a few years coming but the skeleton is plain to view just the same."
Mr. Shields' meeting at the Odd Fellows hall in Marshfield, Thursday night is exciting considerable interest.
