Fourteen Teachers Secured for Year Which Will Open Sept. 9.

COQUILLE, Ore., Sept. 2.—Monday, September 9, is opening day for the Coquille public schools and a large gain over last year's enrollment is looked for, especially in the high school. Superintendent C. A. Howard will again be at the head of the faculty of the Coquille schools and will have 14 teachers. The lower grades will occupy the academy building while the high school and higher grades will be installed in the main building. It is hoped by next year to have a separate building for the high school students as the large gain in the enrollment will make it a necessity. The Academy building, also, is unsanitary.
