NEW MINE IS NEARLY READY

Supt. Hennessey Is Rushing Isthmus Inlet Shaft to Completion.

Pat Hennessey is rapidly completing the new shaft of the Coos Bay & Fuel company, in which C. A. Smith, A. H. Powers, C. L. Trabert and himself are interested. He has already taken out about 300 tons of coal and the shaft opened up so that he expects the daily output to average 300 tons.

He has completed one 300-ton bunker and the logging road track, which will be used for carrying the coal from the shaft to the boats or scows, is being rapidly completed. It is likely that another bunker will be built at the mine or near the upper bay. This will probably depend on whether the company handles the output of the mine in packages, that is sack it, or handle it loose.

Mr. Hennessey expects to have the mine in operation shortly.
