Nearly Done—The new concrete
smokestack of the C. A. Smith com-
pany is rapidly nearing completion.
The concrete work has been complet-
ed, the structure being 232 feet
high. It is now being lined up part
way from the base with brick.

Ferry Traffic—During August,
Capt. Alex Hall, of the ferry Transit,
reports that 5595 passengers, 180
double teams, 233 single teams, 90
autos and 25 head of stock were
hauled between Marshfield and
Eastside.

Fine Concert—The Coos Bay Cou-
ciet Band gave a splendid concert
last evening to a very large crowd
in front of the Chandler Hotel. The
rendition of the different selections
under the leadership of Director R.
N. Featon was excellent.

Clears Channel—Julius Larson's
bucket dredge has been sent to South
Coos River to remove the shoal
termed the "Island," above the Maze.
This shoal has been rapidly getting
larger and was becoming a serious
impediment to navigation.
