





Southern Pacific Will Strengthen Line to Myrtle Point. The Coquille Herald says:

D. D. Pierce, of the Coquille Mill Mercantile company, informs us that his firm has an order for 250,-900 feet of bridge material from the local railway. Several cars of heavy timbers have already been delivered to the railway company and work of repairing and building bridges is now in progress. Bridges on the Beaver Hill branch as well as those on the main line will receive atten-tion.
