COOS COUNTY PRODUCTS.

B. F. Collier has left at the Herald office a Gravenstein apple measuring 15 3-8 by 13 1-8 inches and weighing 23 1-2 ounces. It is the largest apple of that variety ever exhibited, we believe—is perfect in form and free from blemish. The wind caused the apple to fall to the ground, and had it remained on the tree until fully matured, it certainly would have weighed much more. Who can produce a larger apple of the same variety?

D. D. Pierce, while visiting the farm of E. E. Hampton at Arago, recently, procured a head of lettuce raised by Mr. Hampton which weighed five and a half pounds. The lettuce was firm and fluffy and was delicious. No roots were included, only the eatable portion was weighed. Who can beat it?
Dr. Haydon of Marshfield, after a superficial examination of the supposed graphite found by E. C. Barker, pronounced it to be soapstone, possibly containing a small per cent of graphite. In any event it will be of some value as a lubricant. Mr. Barker has sent samples of his find to assay offices to ascertain its true worth.

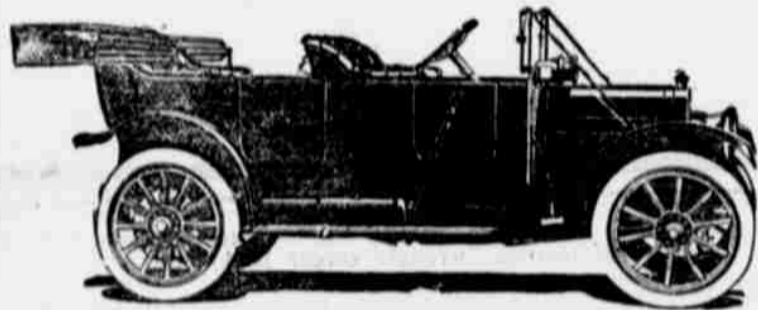
WORK ON LOCAL LINE

Southern Pacific Will Strengthen Line to Myrtle Point.

The Coquille Herald says: D. D. Pierce, of the Coquille Mill & Mercantile company, informs us that his firm has an order for 250,000 feet of bridge material from the local railway. Several cars of heavy timbers have already been delivered to the railway company and work of repairing and building bridges is now in progress. Bridges on the Beaver Hill branch as well as those on the main line will receive attention. Evidently the company is making preparations for heavy traffic to be inaugurated upon completion of the logging road from Myrtle Point to the timber lands owned by the Smith-Powers company. It is believed that at least four logging trains will pass Coquille daily when work in the woods is fully established.
