COOS BAY PORT IS ORGANIZED

(Continued from Page One.) told that the kind of a bridge was to be determined by the government engineers.

It was also proposed to have another session of the Port Commission about the time that Captain Roberts is here.

For Whole Bay. In a short talk in appreciation of the honor of being elected president, L. J. Simpson urged that the commissioners work for the entire Coos Bay, forgetting personal differences and sectional wishes and doing the best for the whole Bay.

Peter Loggie suggested that steps be taken at once to extend the harbor lines to width of 3,000 feet or so.

Mr. Loggie was appointed a committee of one to have the government change the location of the harbor beacon which was knocked off by the recent launching at the North Bend shipyards.

Messrs. Simpson, Powers and Rogers were named as committee to decide which ones of the old ordinances should be readopted.

The two resolutions are as follows:

"BE IT RESOLVED, that the Port of Coos Bay deliver to the Engineering Department of the United States, the sum of Fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00) from the first money obtained from the sale of its bonds, to aid in the improvement of the inner harbor, in a project of a channel 300 feet wide and 25 feet deep at low water, from the Smith mill to the bar, with a turning basin of 500 feet wide and 25 feet deep in front of the towns of Marshfield and North Bend, provided that Congress of the United States appropriates a sufficient sum to complete such a project."

"BE IT RESOLVED, that the Port of Coos Bay offers, as soon as the money is realized from the sale of its bonds, to deliver to the Engineering Department of the United States, One Hundred and Fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000.00) to aid in the renewal and extension of the North Jetty at the entrance to Coos Bay, provided that sufficient sum be appropriated by Congress of the United States, sufficient to complete and extend the North Jetty so as to insure a depth of thirty to forty feet of water at mean low tide on the Coos Bay bar."

CHILD IS RUN DOWN BY AUTO

Four-Year-Old Daughter of L. F. Falkenstein Has Narrow Escape Sunday.

Clare Falkenstein, the little four-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. F. Falkenstein of North Bend had an almost miraculous escape from death last evening when she was struck by an auto driven by A. J. Mendel of Marshfield. As it was she escaped with only a few minor bruises that will not seriously affect her.

The accident was a peculiar one and totally unavoidable. Mr. Falkenstein had the family out for a ride and had stopped to repair a punctured tire. While he was at work, the children got out and were playing around the machine. A. J. Mendel came along from the opposite direction and slowed up and drove close to Mr. Falkenstein's machine so that he could tender his assistance. He did not stop entirely, Mr. Falkenstein assuring him that his services were not needed.

Just as he started ahead, the little girl dodged out from behind the Falkenstein auto and across the street to get some shells that had attracted her attention. She did not see Mr. Mendel's auto and none of the others could see her until she was in the path of the machine.

Luckily the machine was running rather slowly and it merely knocked her down, one of the lights striking her. The light was broken but she fell lengthwise under the middle of the car and the auto passed over her, missing her body completely.

She was hastened to a physician and this morning she was reported getting along nicely.
