

## BOULEVARD IS TALKED OVER

It would benefit nearly everyone in the county.

### May Widen Street.

The council last evening authorized City Engineer Gidley to widen the paving on North Front street, near the curve at the Cold Storage property providing the Terminal Company carries out the offer it made. In order to make an easy curve there, the Terminal Company bought some adjoining property and will run on this property alongside the street. In order to eliminate the trouble it might cause in the operation of trains over the track there, the Terminal Company proposed to have their property added to the width of the street and have the whole thing paved, making the street wider and keeping the track in the middle of the enlarged street. The company is to pay the additional cost of street improvement besides donating the property.

### To Change Plat.

Claude Nasburg appeared before the council and requested the council's permission to change the plat of that part of Nasburg's addition between Ferndale and Marshfield so as to conform with the contour. He said that it was practically impossible to open up a street through the addition now that would not seriously injure some of the holdings, and he and the other property owners there wanted to change it. They want to open up continuation of Second Court in New Bedford Addition. He said that at present that the only use some of the property there now is to pay taxes on and that the change in the plat would make it available. Mayor Straw and City Attorney Goss, who also own property there, concurred, and the council instructed the city engineer to try and devise a new scheme for the addition.

### Street Work.

Hugh McLain asked for a payment on his old work of improving North Cedar Street, now North Broadway, and was told by City Attorney Goss that the litigation which tied up the project would probably be settled at this term of court.

The improvement of Fourth street between Highland and Market was accepted.

Capt. Kruger asked that the Coos Bay Water Company be required to hasten the installation of water mains on Commercial west of Fourth street so that the property owners could plank the street. R. A. Copple made a motion that the water company be notified to do it at once, saying they had had plenty of time. City Attorney Goss said that if they did not do the work in thirty days, they could be fined.

It seemed, according to Mr. Kruger, that Carl Albrecht had told the company that there was no rush and Mr. Kruger and Levi Smith think there is.

Councilman Allen said that there were many complaints because dirt had been put on the planking on North Front street, making it muddy for pedestrians. It is only for a short stretch that the sand and dirt was put on to keep the planks in place for the autoists. Street Commissioner Lawhorne was finally instructed to build a sidewalk along the road at the city's expense.

Councilman F. E. Allen asked that the fifteen-foot street or roadway along the south side of the cemetery be opened up so that delivery wagons could reach the district in the vicinity of his place. He said that a half dozen residents were anxious to have it done. The street committee was empowered to take the matter up and see what could be done. The expense will be small, it is said.

It is also proposed to take the old planking from Fourth street, south of Central, cut it in two and build a twelve-foot plank roadway on Tenth street south.

It was reported that Alva Doll and the special committee appointed to straighten out the street near the cemetery and high school were making progress on the plan.

Councilman Allen said that Barney Kreitzer, Geo. E. Murch and other residents of South Marshfield had requested that when Eleventh street is opened through that the fog in it be reduced by making a gradual curve at Golden, or what would be Golden avenue if that street ran that far. He said they were willing to contribute towards the cost if necessary. The plan was
