**Stage Changes.**—The mail and stage service between Marshfield and North Bend will go on the winter schedule October 1 and will leave here in the evening instead of at 6 o'clock in the morning. The first of this month, the fare was advanced from \$6 to \$7.

**Leave Next Week.**—Dr. Schenck and the Bltmore forest school students, who have been spending a month on the Bay, will leave on the Breakwater September 19. They will go east and sail early next month from New York for the Black Forest in Germany, where they will spend the winter.

**After Cows.**—Residents of the Bunker Hill precinct at the November election will vote on the question of prohibiting cows from running at large there. An initiative petition signed by the required num-

ber of residents has been filed with the county clerk and the question will be put on the ballots at Bunker Hill this fall.

**buys Lots.**—C. M. Anderson, a brother-in-law of J. E. Oren, who recently moved from Minneapolis to Coos Bay, has bought some lots on Seventh street, between Hall and Johnson, from C. E. Gilbert and is moving a house on to them. He is arranging to erect a new house on his other two lots on South Fifth street, between the two fine houses which the Nerdrum Brothers are erecting.

**Street Work.**—The street work is being rushed during the fine weather. Contractor Hugh McLain yesterday started in on the South Fourth street elevated roadway. The Federal Construction Company is completing the base for the hard surface paving and expects their equipment for the surface work here the last of the week. Chas. Noble is having the pliedriver putting in the Terminal line work evenings to hasten its completion on Front street, near Central avenue.

**Hottest Day of Year.**—Yesterday was the hottest day of the year on Coos Bay. The government thermometer kept at the home of U. S. Weather Observer B. B. Ostlund registered 84 in the shade, while the former warmest day this summer was only 78. The warm weather has been very general, having started as far east as Chicago last week, where the heat caused a number of deaths. The warm weather caused no damage to crops here, but was appreciated after the ten days' rainy spell.

**Shriners Hard Trip.**—John Kronholm who returned yesterday reports that he encountered one of the last of the parties of Shriners returning from Coos Bay near Canas Valley. The party consisted of L. L. Mult, Wm. Raymond, Mr. Stone and Mr. Carter and their auto was stuck in the soft mud. They were near the end of the worst part of the road. They got stranded one night and had to remain out all night in the machine. Another time they had a break down and Mr. Mult had to walk eight miles to get repairs. He was wearing low shoes and long before he got over the eight miles he lost them and had to tramp in his stocking feet and his pedal extremities were still very sore. Mr. Kronholm also saw a big Hudson car propped up by the roadside, two of the wheels being gone, evidently for repairs.

**buys Residence Site.**—John D. Jones has purchased a tract of land in First Addition to Marshfield on the point once occupied by the old Eastport Hotel and recognized as one of the beauty spots of Marshfield. Mr. Jones' land faces on Southwest Boulevard and extends eastward to Coal Bank Inlet, which stream serves as the boundary of his tract on one side. The ground purchased is practically rectangular, 150 feet wide and 400 feet long, and it includes a cedar-covered knoll which will make an ideal location for a house. Mr. Jones bought the land for a home site and will build a seven or eight-room residence there next summer. He intends to increase the natural beauty of his grounds by leveling, terracing and seeding to lawn down to the water's edge. His plans also contemplate the building of a boathouse and boatlanding, so that he can go to and from his place of business either by road or by launch.
