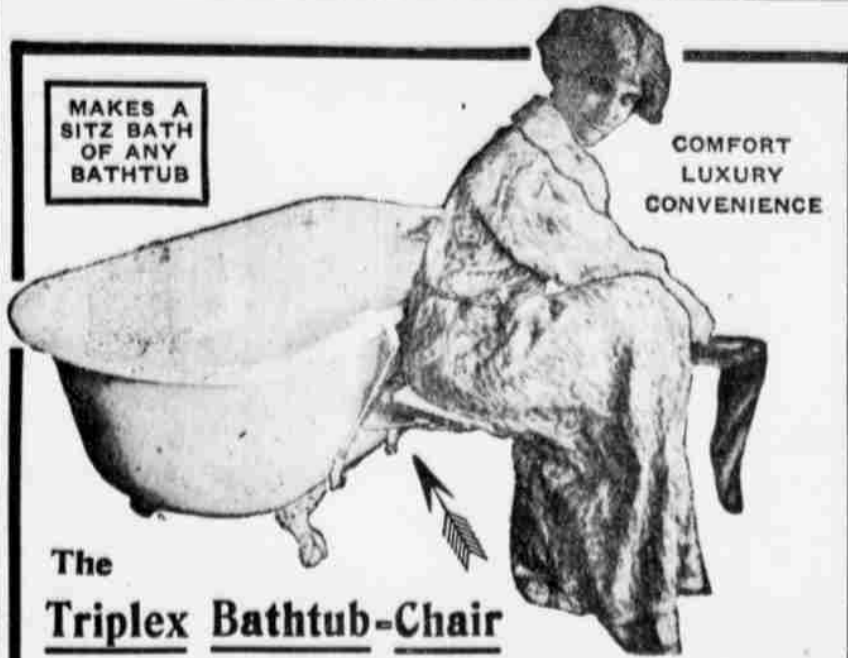

**WATCH REBEL ARMY MOVES**

American Regulars With Cowboys as Scouts Keep Close to Salazar.

(By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 9.—Early dispatches to the War Department reported that General Salazar, the rebel leader, was encamped across the Arizona line opposite the Lang ranch, and was threatening to raid Arizona territory. Major Rice with three troops of cavalry are encamped near Salazar. Outposts have been established on both sides. Armed cowboys are acting as scouts for Rice.

Steever reported that Officers Johnson and Wagner in charge of the patrolling parties talked with Salazar and that Salazar protested that he meant no harm to Americans and was not with his men on the ridge on Culberson's ranch. General Steevers, the dispatch added, said "Lieutenant Johnson does not believe the statement." The rebels are reported to be threatening the city of Orreon.

**OLSSON CASE IS REVERSED**

Government Attorneys Agree to Reversal of Decision that Cost Hanford Position.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 9.—Acting Attorney General Harr instructed the United States attorney in Seattle today to agree to the reversal by Circuit Court of Appeals of former Judge Hanford's decision cancelling the citizenship of Leonard Olsson, the Socialist, which resulted in the impeachment of the proceedings against Hanford and his resignation.

**HODGE NAMED IN WASHINGTON**

Seattle Sheriff Nominated for Governor by Progressives in Primaries.

SEATTLE, Sept. 9.—Returns from the Progressive headquarters in Saturday's primaries indicates the nomination of John E. Ballaine as congressman-at-large, over J. W. Bryan, by about 500 majority. J. A. Falconer was also nominated at large.

Rumors today say that a movement is afoot to disregard the nomination of Robert Hodge of Seattle for governor at tomorrow's convention, which is expected to confirm the nominees of Saturday's primaries and to name ex-Governor Henry McBride, meet with indignant denial by the Progressive leaders.

**NOLAN IN TROUBLE.**

Secretary of Panama Legation Fails to Appear.

NEW YORK, Sept. 10.—Harry E. Nolan of Washington, recently appointed secretary to the United States legation in Panama, failed to appear in police court today to plead to the charge of abducting 16-year-old Marion McVicker of Newport News, Va. His cash bail was ordered forfeited. Two detectives were sent to arrest him.
