Give Reception—A reception was held at the Norwegian Lutheran church last Saturday evening at 8:30 o'clock in honor of the new pastor, Rev. R. O. Thorpe and wife. Speeches were made by several of the pastors and a good time was enjoyed by all.

Son Improved—Word has been received here that Cecil Jones, the young son of J. C. Jones who was recently run down by an auto at Bakersfield, Calif., is getting along nicely. His fractured limbs have been placed in a plaster of Paris cast and it is expected that he will be able to walk in about three months. Mr. Jones is now en route home.

New Marshfield Map—M. O. Hawkins has in preparation a map of township twenty-five south, range thirteen west, which comprises Marshfield and the tide lands contiguous. The map is 48x48 inches. It is an intricate work as it delineates to perfection the zig-zag meander lines and all platted lands on the tide flats belonging to individuals and the state.—Coquille Herald.

Goes Off Grade—Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Anderson met with an accident Sunday evening while riding in their electric auto near the Fitzgerald place south of the city. While attempting a curve in the road the auto went off the embankment. Neither Mr. Anderson or his wife were injured. The machine was reported today to be not badly damaged.

Acting Pastor—Rev. G. LeRoy Hall will occupy the Methodist pulpit during the absence of the pastor, Rev. H. I. Rutledge, who left today to attend the conference in Ashland.

Will Build—John King, a scaler at the Smith mill, has bought two lots from August Frizzen and will erect a home. They are near the Kendall home in West Bunker Hill.

Woodmen Meet—There will be a big initiatory meeting of Coos Bay Camp No. 8498, Modern Woodmen of America at Finnish hall tomorrow night to initiate a large class under the direction of John A. Starr, organizer.

Many Fishing—C. H. Dungan, who came down from Coos River reports that there are 30 boats fishing for salmon between the forks and the mouth of Coos River. There is a fair run of Chinooks. The fishermen are getting four and a half cents a pound for them and about 35 cents apiece for silversides. Nat Tallant is expected in soon from Klamath River, Calif., with a force to open the old Reynolds cannery in Marshfield. Instead of Chinese, he will have a crew of white women in the cannery.

Employ Eighty Men—It is figured that the new Smith mill paper pulp plant will employ about eighty men. As soon as the company starts manufacturing paper here, which will probably be as soon as railroad transportation is available, this force will be more than doubled. The pulp paper mill will have a capacity of about thirty tons per day, or about a third of the capacity of the Willamette Pulp Mill at Oregon City. It will utilize only about one fourth of the waste, it is estimated. Spruce, fir, and hemlock will be used for the manufacture of the pulp.

Terminal Railway—It is announced that the Terminal Railway will not build the line south through the Alliance warehouse immediately. As soon as the front street work is done, it is planned to build over on Central to Broadway and thence south on Broadway to connect up with the road already built there. No piling will be driven for the latter, it being light electric line construction. The work on south Broadway may be held up for the hard surface paving to be put in. It is planned to use the county drawbridge for the line to Bunker Hill and Smith mill.
