Start Auto Line.—The Drain-Coos Bay auto line will start tomorrow morning, with two cars leaving Allegany. All the seats have been reserved and it is possible a third car will be put on. The autos stopped running for a time because of the bad condition of the roads.

Smoker Tonight.—The Millicoma Club will tender an informal smoker this evening complimentary to Capt. H. H. Robert of the United States Engineers, who is on the Bay for the bridge and Mill Slough hearing. It will be for members and invited guests only. It will be informal.

Elks Meet.—The Marshfield lodge of Elks met last evening and elected several new members, whose names will be given out following their initiation the first Wednesday evening in October. The lodge is also considering the advisability of putting on a home talent show. P. N. Reberg, Dr. Burmeister and Don Gardner were among the North Bend members in attendance.

No Contract Yet.—The contract for the Smith-Powers Logging road has not been awarded yet, the last delay being to allow Sam Micheson, a big contractor of British Columbia, to come and figure on it. J. P. O'Brien has been here some time in his interests. Mr. Micheson will arrive tonight via Myrtle Point and will be met there by F. A. Warner, Vernon Smith and Mr. O'Brien.

DR. E. MINGUS returned yesterday from a visit with his mother at Ashland. He says Coos Bay is getting a great deal of favorable advertising from the visit of the Shriners here, all having been greatly impressed. He says the road between Myrtle Point and Roseburg with the exception of the sixteen miles of the canyon on the Douglas county end is in fairly good shape. The Coos county end of the road has been greatly improved by a reduction of the grades during the past year.

S. O. COMPANY MUST PAY TAX

The Southern Oregon Company must pay its taxes to Coos County, according to a ruling in the circuit court today. The amount involved is about \$76,000. The company brought an injunction suit against the county, to restrain the sheriff from collecting the taxes. Judge Coke made a ruling that the money should be paid in escrow to the sheriff. Assistant District Attorney Liljeqvist took the case up for the county.

The Southern Oregon Company claimed that it should not be made to pay the taxes, in view of the fact that the government had started action disputing their title to their property in this county. Mr. Liljeqvist took the position that the company either owned the property or did not own it. He claimed that if the company owned the property the taxes should be paid and if the company did not own the land it should be turned over to the government. Judge Coke upheld this position and dismissed the injunction suit which leaves the sheriff free to collect the taxes.

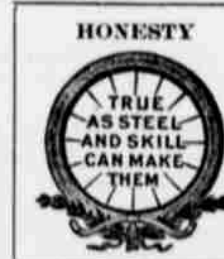

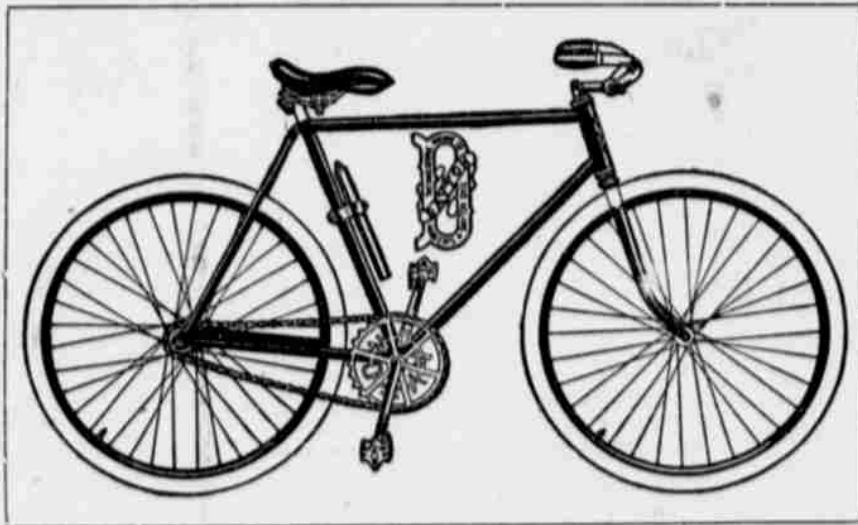
