**CLAY IS GOOD**

E. C. Barker Received Encouraging Reports from Experts. E. C. Barker who discovered in this county clay which he believed would be of value for its graphite has received encouraging reports from the state chemist. The material contains but little graphite but it is of value for pottery clay. The following letter explains itself:

Eugene, Ore., Sept. 10, 1912.  
Mr. E. C. BARKER,  
Marshfield, Oregon.

Dear Sir:  
In the cotton packing in this box you will find a couple of pieces of the material you submit. I moulded a brick from some of your samples, broke into two parts, and burned one of them, in this way securing the pieces enclosed. You will see from this that the material is a clay of high plastic value, and with but a small shrinkage upon burning. If you have a large amount of it easily accessible, it should have some value for pottery making.

At first sight this material looks like graphite, but in spite of the close resemblance I do not believe that there is any graphite in it. At most it could be only an insignificant trace, and to determine just how much would be a costly process in no way worth while.

I have never seen a clay just like this one, and later shall examine its chemical composition more exactly. If anything interesting should develop I shall be pleased to let you know.

If I can be of further service to you in any way, please let me know.

News Notes of Interest Found in Columns of Tribune.

M. L. Barrett is engaged in building a residence for E. J. Lonon on the Tichenor property near O. Levee's cottage.

Several options on large real estate holdings in this neighborhood have been consummated during the past week or ten days—an indication of expected railroad activity.

The Christian Endeavor was reorganized at Port Orford last Sunday and the following officers were elected: Mrs. R. C. Young, president; Miss Ruth Stone, vice president; Miss Edna Richard, secretary; Miss Lottie Dean, treasurer, and Miss Laura Sutton, organist.

Gordon Land, a prominent mining engineer, has been looking over some mines in this section during the past week. This is not Mr. Land's first trip to Curry county, as he was brought back here at this time as the result of former investigations and his belief that bright future awaits the development of the mines along this part of the coast country.

The band of sheep being driven out of this county by Harvey Smith were in Port Orford last Thursday night. There was between 3100 and 3200 in the drove, and they were being taken to Oakland. Several hundred more will be picked up in the northern end of the country. It was one of the largest bands ever driven out of Curry and when traveling they were strung along the road for several miles.

The Frank Tanning Company contemplate reopening business at Frankport, a small summer harbor, about 20 miles south of Port Orford, next spring for the purpose of shipping tanbark. They have offered \$13 a cord for the bark, which is \$5 more than was paid in former years, but owners do not seem anxious to sell even at this price. If they start business, Will Colebrook will look out for the interests of the tanning company.

**FAIR NEXT WEEK.**

Coos and Curry Counties Will Show at Myrtle Point.

The first fair of the Coos and Curry Counties Fair Association will be held at Myrtle Point next Wednesday, September 25, and continuing for four days. It is expected that there will be a fine display of exhibits of all kinds.

Substantial cash premiums aggregating hundreds of dollars are to be awarded exhibitors of horses, cattle, sheep, swine, poultry, farm and dairy products, flowers and women's work, industrial displays, etc. In addition to the foregoing, \$600 will be awarded for school children's exhibits. Friday, September 27, will be children's day at which time all school children will be admitted to the grounds free.

Superintendent Bunch states that the railroad company will convey all exhibits of the children to the fair and return free when the same are taken charge of by a competent person to care for in the manner of baggage.

All entries close on Wednesday, September 25, and must be in place and on exhibition at 9 o'clock in the morning of the following day.
