NEED NEW TENDER.
Recommendation for One May Be Made by Inspector.

According to the following in the Portland Journal, another lighthouse tender may be furnished for the Pacific coast:
Among the recommendations that may be made to congress at its next session by the lighthouse board, may be one for a light tender for this district, according to G. R. Putnam, commissioner of lighthouses who arrived here late last night from the north.

Inspector eBek, of the Seventeenth district, has recommended that such a craft be built for the district for use in the shallow waters of ports on the Oregon Coast. Mr. Putnam says that this recommendation will be submitted for a new tender for Alaska to take the place of the America, which was wrecked last summer. If one is secured for the Sixteenth district, says Commissioner Putnam, the tender Columbine, now doing duty in Alaskan waters, will come back here to her old station.

PRIEST A DEPUTY.
NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—For the first time in the history of New York City a Roman Catholic priest has been named a deputy sheriff. The wearer of the shield is Rev. Father James B.
