WOODBURN MAKES LIGHT CONTRACT FOR 15 YEARS.

WOODBURN, Ore., Sept. 24.—After nearly three years of negotiations between the city and the Portland Railway, Light and Power company over the street lighting contract, the Council on Tuesday night adopted a resolution authorizing the Mayor and Recorder to enter into a contract with the company for a system of 140 incandescent lights of 80 candlepower, which will be distributed so as to light all parts of the city. The contract is for a term of 15 years and the city will pay \$14.40 for each lamp annually. The company agrees to pay a penalty of 10 cents a lamp for each and every night that any lamp may fall to burn.

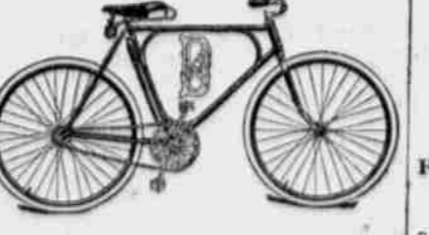
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
