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OTHER BIG STRIKE STARTS AT LAWRENCE; 4,300 MEN OUT

WATKINSON MANAGE THE AFFAIR. Spectators That the Strike May Spread to Include Mine Workers.

LAWRENCE, Mass., Sept. 27.—A protest against the imprisonment of Joseph Ettore and Ar-Giovanitti, I. W. W. organizers, 4,300 textile operatives struck today. No serious disorder is reported during the early hours of the strike. The prisoners are held by the commonwealth with accessories before the fact in the death of Anna Lopizzo, who was killed in the January strike. A strike which first affected the wood and air mills spread to other mills during the morning. Prospects of the American mills being affected. Several strikers who urged others to go to work and air mills to quit work arrested and charged with disturbing the peace and a man addressing a crowd near the Wash-mill, was also taken into custody. In all 12,000 operatives are on strike. Many of being strikers, others were forced out by shutting down of departments. William Yates, national I. W. W. leader, sent a telegram to Chid-day asking that W. D. Hay-wood be sent to Lawrence to take charge of the strike.

BANK ROBBERS FINALLY CAUGHT

Man and Woman Connected With British Columbia Robbery Are Arrested.

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 27.—A year's chase following the New West-minster, B. C., bank robbery ended here in the arrest of J. C. Adams, who was declared today to be wanted as one of the robbers. The arrest of his supposed wife, known to the police as Jeanette Little, in Edwardsville, Ill., last night, completed the task of the local police and private detectives who have been holding Adams since early Wednesday. Adams, who also was known as Walter Stacy, is declared by the detectives to have been one of the men who beat Lieut. Burns of Chicago into unconsciousness September 19. The man arrested as Adams or Stacy is believed by local Bertillon officials to be George West, reputed leader of the Canadian bank robbers. Detectives said they knew him only as Adams or Stacy.

CHICAGO, Sept. 27.—The description of "Stacy" fits both Frank

West and Doc Dancell, who are being hunted as members of the gang of bank robbers. The police here are inclined to think that Stacy, West and Dancell are all one man and that Dancell is his right name.

KNOWN IN CHICAGO.

CHICAGO, Sept. 27.—"We haven't connected Adams with the bank robbery yet but believe he is one of the men who attacked Lieut. Burns," said Assistant Chief Schuttler today. "Burns has partly identified the photograph of the prisoner. Burns may go to St. Louis to identify the man. If he does the man may be brought to Chicago."

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 27.—Detectives who were effective in the pursuit of the New Westmin-ster bank robbers stated today that Adams arrested in St. Louis is neither Al Addison nor Frank West. Addison is the third of a trio which is charged with actively having participated in the robbery and has never been heard of.

AN AMERICAN KILLS WOMAN

Shoots Barmaid and Wounds Three Others in the East End of London.

LONDON, Sept. 27.—A man giving his name as Titus and claiming to be an American, shot and killed a barmaid and seriously wounded three other people and for a time caused a semi-panic today in the East End. The act of Titus followed a dispute with the barmaid. He was finally overcome and arrested.

POLICE BATTLE WITH NEGRO

One Man at Louisville Holds at Bay Big Detail of Officers.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Sept. 27.—After being held at bay all night by a drug-crazed negro, Louisville police early today rushed the barricade and captured him before he could make any further resistance. The prisoner, Edward Jackson, was arrested last night on a trivial charge. He resisted and took refuge in a deserted house from which he began shooting at pedestrians. After one policeman was dangerously wounded a riot call was sent in. Jackson's fire was so well directed that the police were forced to carry on a long-dis-tance battle for two hours before they could make a rush. Two other negroes were found with Jack-son. It is believed they were in the house when Jackson took refuge there and that he compelled them to fight with him.

MRS. W. BUCK BADLY HURT

Struck by Lumber Truck and Skull Fractured—Recovery Not Likely.

Mrs. William Buck, wife of Wm. Buck, the carpenter, and residing at the corner of Tenth and Flanagan, was injured yesterday afternoon and is in a critical condition. She is at Mercy hospital and it is feared she will not recover.

Mrs. Buck was on the street near the Williams building. She stepped to one side to avoid a delivery wagon and in doing so stepped in front of one of the lumber truck cars on the Smith tramway. It is supposed that she did not see the lumber car coming as she stepped deliberately in front of it and was thrown down.

Mrs. Buck's skull was fractured and she never regained consciousness. Last night Dr. Mingus trephined the skull in the hopes of giving some relief but Mrs. Buck today is in a critical condition.

Mrs. Buck has lived in Marshfield for some years past. She was a native of England and has a daughter living in Georgia. Mrs. Buck was past fifty years of age and had not been well lately yesterday being the first time that she had been out for some weeks past.

MARSHFIELD IS NOW ON MAP

PORTLAND AUTO CLUB CAR ARRIVES HERE TODAY ON REGULAR TOUR.

The Portland Auto Club car "Pathfinder," engaged in making a map of the auto roads of Oregon, arrived in this city this morning from Roseburg, making the trip in seven hours.

The car is in charge of E. K. Frank with H. R. Glenn as chauffeur and was accompanied by F. J. Laher, a business man of Port-land. G. F. Beck, publisher of the Oregon Auto Blue book accompa-nied the car to Roseburg and will rejoin the party at Eugene.

Mr. Frank reported the roads in good condition between Rose-burg and Marshfield, except a stretch between Ollalla and Rock Creek. The car is thoroughly equipped with meters, measuring distance, grade and altitude. The highest point between Roseburg and Marsh-field is 1400 feet, a point on the summit between Ollalla and Camas valley, and 24 miles from Rose-burg. The party came from Roseburg to Marshfield in seven hours. The trip to Myrtle Point being made in about five hours. According to the meter on the car the distance from Myrtle Point to Marshfield is 29 miles. The present party is engaged in making roadmaps of the state and the new map will include Marsh-field with all information as to condition of roads and manner of reaching here.
