SAYS WE ARE PROSPEROUS

Bishop Scadding Has a Good Word for Coos on Returning Home.

Bishop Scadding thinks that Coos county is prosperous, according to the following in the Portland Journal: Bishop Charles Scadding of the Oregon Episcopal church has just returned from his annual visitation of parishes and missions of Coos county. Three weeks were spent among the church people of Gardiner, Empire, North Bend, Coquille, Bandon, and Marshfield. "I was much impressed with the improved conditions and the spirit of the people," said Bishop Scadding. "They are waiting with great interest the advent of trains from Eugene and Marshfield and the improvement of Coos bay harbor. They believe that that part of the country is in for a great development. I think there is no question of the future development along commercial and material lines, and I am especially interested in having the development of the church keep pace. Dean Horsfall has charge of the work from Bandon south, and Rev. Robert Browning is working from Marshfield north. Both clergymen are working hard, and have the loyal co-operation of the lay people. Financial conditions, as indicated by returns to the church, are better than ever before. During my work there, I stayed in my cabin at Bandon by the seaside."

BUILDING AT HARBOR.

Extensive Improvements Are Being Made at Curry County Town.

Extensive improvement work is being done at Harbor in Curry county, according to the following from the Gold Beach Globe:

Charles Smith of Harbor, the owner and manager of the Harbor Townsite property, was in town recently, giving some idea of what has been accomplished there as well as what has been planned for the future. The large feed barn is now complete with eighty tons of hay mowed away. The new hotel being built by Mr. Smith is now almost finished. The building is a 27-room house, built something on the plan of a bungalow and of peeled fir logs of uniform size. The opening of the new hostelry will be celebrated by a dance on the evening of the 28th. Mr. Smith expects a saw mill to be built there in the near future by Portland capital, and as soon as building material can be procured many buildings will be erected. Other and more extensive improvements are in course of incubation that have not matured sufficiently to warrant their publicity.
