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WOULD STAY EXECUTION.

U. S. Government Intercedes in Favor of J. N. Carson. (By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times).

Carson of Kingsland, Texas, under sentence to be shot at Tampico, Mexico, pending a full investigation of the charges against him. Carson's alleged offense is not known to the State department.

PREPARE DEFENSE.

Paris Police Provide Means for Protection. (By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times)

PARIS, Sept. 30.—The war-like destruction of the Paris bandits several months ago, when a small army was necessary to defeat and kill several terrorists who had turned a house into a fortress, induced the police to evolve some instrument which would protect them from the bullets of similar bandits in the future. The result was the manufacture of a powerful steel shield designed to protect the policeman's body in case of future conflicts.

M. Lepine, the prefect of police, likewise appointed a commission to study other means of defense and offense in coping with the new type of modern criminal. The commission has proposed a sort of shell, weighing about a pound, which, launched by special apparatus, emits a powerful gas which momentarily blinds the bandits and makes effective fighting on their part impossible. Experiments with the new projectile were entirely successful, and the deadly gas shell has now taken its place among the instruments of police attack.

FISHERMEN ORGANIZE.

Union Formed by Those Engaged in Work on Umpqua.

The fishermen on the Umpqua river have formed a union for their mutual benefit. It will be a local union affiliated with the Columbia River union. The latter was organized in 1882 and it is claimed by fishermen that those engaged in the work on the Columbia are quite independent because of their union. The fishermen of the Umpqua believe that a union will not only benefit and protect the fishermen, but will bring about a better understanding between the fishermen and their employers.

The new union started with 34 members. Jerry Ruben, who was a charter member of the union when it was formed on the Columbia, has been made president of the Umpqua union.

COLLEGE BARS DRINK.

Students Who Frequent Saloons Will Be Expelled.

EUGENE, Sept. 30.—To make dryness doubly dry, the faculty of control over the actions of the students, not only while they are in Eugene where no liquor can be sold, but even when they leave the college town for other cities.

A drastic rule has been passed under which drinking in any saloon makes a student subject to dismissal. No improprieties had been reported but it was thought best to go on record at once, and let the students know what to expect. The faculty feels that this extension of authority is justified by the fact that many of the students are under age, and are entrusted to the University by their parents, and that it will be sustained by the public sentiment of Oregon.
