BOAT LAWS ARE STRICT

Many Owners of Launches Are Not Meeting the Requirements.

An inspector has been looking into the equipment of the gasoline boats in the Coos ports with a view of seeing that they carry the lights, whistles and other appliances that are required by law.

Many people have the impression that a boat not engaged in carrying passengers for hire is not required to carry lights, whistle, etc., but that is a mistake.

A folder furnished by the government for distribution among boatmen gives the regulations in a condensed form.

NOT REQUIRED TO DECLARE

Republican Central Committee Does Not Demand an Expression.

County candidates on the Republican ticket were not called upon to declare themselves for either Roosevelt or Taft by the county Republican central committee.

A resolution was presented endorsing the Republican platform and the administration of Taft and also requested that the county candidates be asked to declare themselves as to the allegiance to Taft.
