appears to me that each organization should find a measure of satisfaction in the work it is doing and attract to its fold on the basis of its works without its defenders going out of their way to attack another denomination because of the increased encouragement held out by such denomination in the name of religion, the basis for which encouragement is found in the teachings of the Bible.

If Christian Science is causing people to analyze the basis of their present beliefs, to insist upon less contradiction in the statement of the essentials of religion and a greater consistency between the declared nature of the Supreme Being and that which is believed to be the manifestation thereof, it will mean only good to the race. The author of the interesting work "Alter Fires Relighted" says "Christian nations are already staggering under a load of debt which amounts to \$34,000,000,000, on which the interest alone is nearly \$1,000,000 annually. This indebtedness has been almost wholly incurred by outlays for war purposes." He also declares that during the past fiscal year the five leading nations in Christendom spent over \$1,000,000,000 to maintain a peace basis with each other. In the face of this accumulation, in spite of the existence and activity of the old churches, why should they not welcome another organization to aid in the prevention of evil thinking which is the forerunner of evil action?

The critic has many objections to Christian Science. He complains that its textbook cannot be understood by learned scholars. The teachings of the Nazarene was considered foolishness by the learned Greeks, but others understood it. Humanity has tried to believe so much that is contradictory about religion that the demand of the simple and consistent statements of Christian Science may require the abandonment of ideas previously held and the adjustment be slow for a time. Naturally if Christian Science promises the world a greater degree of freedom from evil than has been obtained through following other systems of religious thought, its teachings as to the method of overcoming evil and the healing of disease only to the extent orthodox Christianity and materia medica believe possible, these systems would not be concerned. Christian Science maintains that the presence and power of God may be availed of today through prayer and without the necessity of setting a limit upon the effectiveness thereof.

The critic speaks of the province of the church in healing disease as limited to functional troubles. I saw a statement some time ago, which was verified, of the healing of a large number of cases of disease through Christian Science in a certain state in this country during the period of one year. The statement included 17 cases of rheumatism, 16 of tuberculosis, 10 of tumors, 6 of cancers, 33 of stomach trouble, 7 of appendicitis, 7 of heart disease and many others. This is not given in a boastful spirit, but simply as a record of what is possible through reliance wholly upon God through recognition of the infinite power of His love.

When Christian Science declares God to be the only Creator and to be wholly good as the Bible teaches, it must naturally teach that the experience of pain and sorrow cannot be charged to Him and in that sense they are untrue and unreal and can be abolished in the degree that the goodness and aliveness of God are understood. The discord of human experience is declared to be due to a mistaken sense of God and man's relationship to Him and it is not difficult to understand that while a mistake may appear to the senses to be very real, it will disappear with the coming of the truth.

The critic assails the statement of Christian Science as to God and Christ and cites the instance of a man who became an atheist in attempting to believe its teachings. I know of many men who were "without God and without hope in the world," who became devoted believers in God and His Christ when Christian Science unfolded to them the concept of an unchanging and everlasting good God as divine Principle, and

the Christ as the divine idea coming to human consciousness declaring truth and overcoming error. It is necessary to use several terms in order to define the aliveness of God to the human consciousness. Life, Truth, Love, Spirit, Soul, Mind, are not used in Christian Science simply as referring to qualities of God, but are so many statements of the all comprehensiveness of God and which are summed up in the word Principle. The law of God which is seen in the infinite power of Divine Love to bless mankind must be recognized and obeyed and it is the business of Christian Science to show mortals how to become obedient to this law. In doing so they will obtain here and now a great degree of satisfaction in the possession and utilization of good and will consequently overcome evil in a greater measure than heretofore.

### THE SOCIALISTS' VIEW OF FREEDOM.

Justus Miles Forman begins a new serial story in the October Woman's Home Companion, entitled "Through the Open Door." It is a "votes for women" story and will probably create considerable discussion among those interested in this subject. In the first chapter a young Socialist, talking to an 18-year-old girl on the subject of freedom, says:

"I mean just what I say. People ought to want freedom. They ought to want it so hard that they'd be in physical agony for the lack of it. They ought to stand up together in a gigantic yearning army and take it! Instead of which they run about in little circles and yammer about wages and agreements, and the fair division of property. Property—that everlasting fetish of property! The rich man has it in square miles, and yet he hasn't enough; the poor man howls that he isn't given his fair share. If they dream at night they dream of money or of some kind of beastly happiness that money can buy for them. They never even think of the word freedom, or, if they do, they mean freedom to gobble more wealth, more property. Freedom's just a doorway to them—a means, not the summit and end of all things.

"Very few people have ever even dreamed of what freedom is. You see, things have got into a most terrible mess. This idea of property has blinded and crazed everyone. And, such as it is, there's no doubt it's badly distributed and that it's going from bad to worse. The rich have got too much of it, together with the power it gives, and the poor too little. That was well enough—up to a certain breaking point—under the old feudal system. Social classes were hard and fast things. There were not any newspapers, nor schools, nor votes, nor walking delegates. The poor expected to be poor and that was the end of it. And now that there is education of a kind, now that there's a popular press, now that labor has begun to think—well, there's another breaking point ahead, I fancy. Another social war. Another French revolution.

"After that freedom, perhaps. A chance for it, anyhow. After that great leveling, when property is no longer gathered into big terrifying heaps here and there, but is spread about under foot, perhaps it will lose its fascination for the men who are living then. Then there'll grow up a race that's truly free. Free to develop, each one of them, as his own nature indicates and permits. That'll be a race of giants."
