SCIENTIFIC PARAGRAPHS.

For treating persons afflicted with defective speech simple apparatus has been invented for measuring the pressure of the tongue when certain sounds are uttered. Badgers and foxes are hunted in some sections of Portugal by sending into their burrows dogs which carry small electric lights on their collars to frighten them out.

A gun that can be carried on an aeroplane and with which accurate shooting has been done while flying at high speed has been perfected by United States army officers.

A prize worth \$11,000, offered by the Kaiser, will be awarded to the German maker of the best aeroplane motor in a competition, which will last from October to January.

The lowest grade molasses from beet sugar, which is unsalable as a food product, has been found to make an excellent binder for road surfaces when mixed with lime water.

An adjustable frame, in which several pieces of crayon can be fastened to draw parallel lines at various distances apart on a blackboard, has been patented by a New York man. A cork extractor patented in England comprises an awl-like stem with a loose cross bar, which is passed through the cork with the stem, turning against the cork as it is withdrawn.

Automatic regulation of the temperature of residences is provided by a new thermostat, which switches electric current to a motor to open or close drafts in the heating apparatus.

The famous Victoria Falls of the Zambesi river in Rhodesia, it is estimated, could be made to yield 35,000,000 horsepower, or just about the same amount as all of Europe's water courses.
