SHIELDS READY TO DEBATE

C. S. Shields Has Challenged All Single Tax Workers.
(Special to The Times.)

PORTLAND, Oregon, Oct. 9.—In a statement he sent all over the state of Oregon, W. S. U'Ren, a Fels paid single tax worker, charged that Chas. S. Shields was afraid to meet him in debate. It is now three days since Mr. Shields, who is secretary of the Oregon Equal Taxation league, challenged not only U'Ren but every single taxer in Oregon to meet him at any time during the last two weeks of the campaign.

Nelther U'Ren, Cridge, Benough, Wagnon, Coulter, McAllister or Orton or any of the other numerous Fels workers have replied to this challenge. The challenge covers every single taxer in Oregon and it is addressed to any or all single taxers anywhere.

Mr. Shields wants to meet three or four of them at a time but they are strangely silent. There are no strings to the challenge. "The next time I am accused of cowardice," said Secretary Shields today, "I want every one to know that neither U'Ren or any one of his friends has the manhood to take up a straight from the shoulder challenge. Is it not obvious that single tax is a trick when these people decline absolutely to back up their statements in debate?"

NATIONAL GATHERING

Chamber of Commerce of Whole Country Is to Meet.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 8.—The first annual meeting of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States will be held in this city during the week beginning January 20, 1913. This was decided upon by the Board of Directors in Boston last week. Seventeen were present to discuss the affairs of the National Chamber. All unfinished legislation of the 61st Congress affecting business interests was assigned to committees for study and report. A referendum on the subject of a national budget was authorized to be immediately submitted to the commercial organizations of the Nation. The Directors remained in Boston to participate in the International Congress of Chambers of Commerce. The Directors will next meet in St. Louis, Missouri, November 19 to arrange the program of the January meeting.

The third issue of the Nation's Business, published by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States for the use of editorial writers and officials of commercial organizations will appear October 21, and will furnish a full list of unfinished business legislation of the 61st Congress. It will also deal with the general subject of Porto Rican development, since the administration of the affairs of the Island passed into American hands.

CHINESE BRING BIG PROFITS

Inspectors Think the Sampson Crew Cleaned Up Thousands of Dollars.

(By Associated Press to The Coos Bay Times.)
SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 8.—Twenty-eight to forty thousand dollars is the estimate of the Immigration bureau today as the profit cleaned up yesterday by the crew of the launch Sampson No. 2, which ran the gauntlet of three government cutters and two submarines, after landing a cargo of contraband Chinese and escaped to sea. Sixty Chinese were awaiting transportation at Esenada. It is the belief of the inspectors that 40 of these were smuggled at the price of \$700 to \$1000 a head. A watch is being kept for the Sampson the length of the southern coast, but little hope of taking her is held.
