Marquard Pitching for New York Kept Boston Helpless Till Ninth.

New York's hitting was timely and effective. Boston fielded superbly.

Band of 1000 Men Cross the Turkish Frontier and Are Driven Back.

PEOPLE CHEER THE KING OF GREECE

Set Up Cry of "Hurrah for the War" to Greet Ruler.

LONDON, Oct. 10.—Heavy losses were inflicted by Turkish troops on a band of Greeks numbering about 1000 men, who attacked today a Turkish frontier post near Dhis-kala. They were driven back over the frontier, according to a news agency dispatch from Saloniki.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 10.—More energetic intervention by the powers in order to prevent an outbreak of hostilities on the part of Bulgaria, Servia and Greece and to bring about a cessation of the war with Montenegro, is said to be contemplated today. Shots are reported exchanged today between the Turkish and Bulgarian troops occupying the advanced posts on the Turko-Bulgarian frontier at Timeusa and Klissura.

Burning Villages. VIENNA, Oct. 10.—Many Albanian villages north of the Boyana river are in flames according to a newspaper dispatch from Cattaro.

ATHENS, Oct. 10.—Great enthusiasm was aroused throughout Greece by a speech made by King George to several thousand people assembled in the palace to welcome his return to the capital last night.

A Greek premier addressing a large crowd last night said he still hoped for peace. The crowds greeted the remark with the cry: "Hurrah for the war."
