

URGES SCHOOL DEMOCRACY

San Francisco Board of Education to Make Important Changes.

The following article from the San Francisco Examiner, is one that will be of interest to parents of public school pupils everywhere, as well as to teachers. Miss Sallie Jones is an aunt of E. K. Jones of this city.

The Examiner says: Taking the position that the growing desire for costly dress and vulgar display in the public schools is working hardships among the children of the poor, and causing them humiliation, Miss Sallie J. Jones, a member of the board of education, began a campaign yesterday to put pupils on a more democratic level.

Miss Jones believes that the encouragement of the tendencies complained of among the children of the well-to-do is leading to caste lines in the schools.

She would abolish class pins in grammar schools, prohibit social affairs, flowers and the exchange of presents on the school premises, and wants the teachers constantly to urge simpler styles of dress.

Poor Girls the Sufferers.
The girl pupils of hard-working parents particularly suffer by the conditions referred to by Miss Jones. These daughters of the poor are constantly embarrassed by their more gayly dressed sisters, she points out, and the contrasts furnished in their dress and social position make for class distinctions, which are in antipathy to the spirit of the public schools.

Miss Jones began her campaign to wipe out caste lines in the schools with a communication to the board of education yesterday.

Her letter, which aroused much interest among the members of the schools committee, to whom it was referred, urged the board to adopt a set of ironclad rules that would put the pupils on an absolute social parity during school hours.

Here are the rules in detail:
Miss Jones' Rules.

Abolish class pins in grammar schools.
Prohibit all but one social affair for each graduation class, to follow graduation, and so conducted that there shall positively be no assessments.

All grammar school graduations shall take place on Thursday afternoon of the last week of the term.

Urge principals and class teachers to use the last hours in directing children as to their choice of high or advanced schools or in the selection of employment.

Graduation exercises shall consist of musical selections prepared from day to day during the school year and of other numbers that are the direct outcome of the year's educational work.

No flowers, candy or present of any description shall be presented on school premises.

No class presents to the school shall be given. Money shall not be collected at all.

Simple dressing shall be urged. Any child who disobeys the direction of the principal in these matters shall be refused his diploma until he shall have called upon the president of the board of education.

Teachers Indorse Move.
The rule prohibiting the collection of money among the children is considered by many teachers to be one of the best urged by Miss Jones.

Instances have been known where poor families were compelled to quit themselves of absolute necessities to allow their children to "save face" at graduation exercises.

WOULD SERVE STATE.

Class in Economics Will Attempt to Assist Commonwealth.

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 10.—In an effort to prepare statistics and gather material that will assist the State Legislature, the University senior class in economic research will, for the next two or three months, devote its efforts toward problems confronting the state of Oregon. They will undertake to gather all available material upon the subjects under consideration, and, possibly, formulate some plan of legislative procedure.

Among the problems to be attacked are political reorganization for the state of Oregon; co-operative for the farmers in an effort to eliminate the middleman, and reduce the cost of living; the development of Oregon's water power resources; credit associations for the farmers to furnish capital to develop Oregon resources, and scientific budgetmaking for state, county and municipality.

DEAL WITH MARCONI.

British Government Will Have More Wireless.

LONDON, Oct. 10.—The House of Commons reopened this week after a recess of two months. Among the important matters to be discussed at this session is the British government's contracts with the Marconi Company which provide that the British government supply the company with \$3,000,000 for the building of five great wireless stations. Australia is to supply \$500,000 for another station and the whole to form a wireless circuit around the globe.

BIG CELEBRATION IN EUGENE.

Coming of Oregon Electric to be Marked with Exercises.

(Special to The Times)
EUGENE, Oct. 10.—Of great importance to the whole of western Oregon is the opening on the 15th of this month of service on the Oregon Electric between Albany and Eugene, for it marks the passing of Oregon towns without transportation competition. Salem, Albany and Corvallis in the past have had the river to offer at least nominal competition but Eugene, like the cities of southwestern Oregon, has had to depend on a single railroad for all transportation. Eugene, President Young says, is not the terminus, and it is only a question of time until the Hill line will be reaching out for Roseburg, Grants Pass and Medford.

The passing of this condition is to be properly celebrated by the city of Eugene, assisted by the officials of the Oregon Electric company. Excursions are to be run from all points on the Oregon Electric, and fully 6000 visitors are expected from the outside.

Carl Gray, under whom the greater part of the preliminary work was done, promises to be present if he can get here, and answers are expected daily from Louis W. Hill and other high officials of the Hill lines in the east. Of course all the active officers of the Oregon Electric and other Hill lines in Oregon will be there.

Invitations, too, have been issued to the mayors, members of the city councils, and commercial club officers of all the cities in western Oregon.

To entertain these guests there will be a parade in which the industrial riches of the upper Willamette valley will be featured, and there will be other interesting events to mark the event with the attention it deserves.

I believe in direct presidential primaries.

I believe in legislation relieving the sheriff's office of the collection of taxes, placing it in the hands of a special officer, also a uniform system of collecting, auditing and handling same in every county throughout the state.

I believe in a reasonable exemption of household and personal effects from taxation, to a valuation of \$500.00.

If elected, I will work for the abolishment of the office of County School Supervisor, as I consider it a useless expenditure of public money.

If elected, I will use my best efforts for the passage of the so-called Blue Sky Law, prohibiting the operation of fake corporations in this state.

If elected, I will refuse to represent any faction and will always aid any resident of the district in any meritorious legislation.
