

PORT TAKES AN IMPORTANT STEP

(Continued from Page One.)

fers to the Government of the United States the sum of \$150,000 to be expended by the said Government with funds by it appropriated in the restoration and extension of the north jetty at the entrance to Coos Bay; and further the Port of Coos Bay offers to the said Government the sum of \$50,000 to be expended by the said Government with funds by it appropriated in dredging and improving a channel in the harbor of Coos Bay from the C. A. Smith mill at the mouth of Isthmus Inlet to the sea; and further the Port of Coos Bay proposes to improve by dredging or otherwise the subsidiary waterways on Coos Bay, to purchase water front for the purpose of public wharves and warehouses, and generally, with or without the aid of the United States, to improve the conditions of navigation within the Port of Coos Bay as empowered by Section 6121, Lord's Oregon Laws.

Section 2. To carry out the above project, offers and proposals, the Board of Commissioners of the Port of Coos Bay hereby authorizes the issuance of a series of bonds, to be known as Series A, in the total amount of \$300,000; each bond of said issue shall be in denomination and payable at such a place as the purchaser thereof may designate, shall bear interest at the rate of five per cent, per annum, payable semi-annually, be executed by the President and Secretary of said Board of Commissioners, and conditioned that the Port of Coos Bay shall therein and thereby undertake, promise and agree in consideration of the premises and be held to pay at the place therein designated to the bearer thereof the sum therein designated in gold coin of the United States, with interest thereon in like gold coin at the rate of five per cent, per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of January and July of each year, in accordance with the tenor and terms of interest coupons thereto attached. Said bonds shall be made up in lots of \$25,000 each, and the first lot of \$25,000 shall run for twenty years, the second lot for twenty-one years, and so on, to the end that bonds in the sum of \$25,000 shall mature on the twentieth year from date of issue and likewise on each year thereafter until the whole issue thereof shall have matured.

Section 3. The Treasurer of the Board of Commissioners of the Port of Coos Bay shall make proper and necessary rules and regulations to govern the bidding for said bonds and the sale thereof, and shall advertise the sale thereof for four successive weeks in the Portland Journal of Portland, Oregon. Said bids shall be opened by the Treasurer in the presence of the Board of Commissioners at the regular meeting of said Board in December, 1912. Said bonds shall be sold to the best bidder therefor in case a satisfactory bid is submitted. And the said Board expressly reserves the right to reject any and all bids therefor, and in case no satisfactory bid is made, the Board will reserve the right to sell said bonds thereafter at either public or private sale; provided always that said bonds shall not be sold at such discount, nor shall said bonds be anti-dated, nor any other arrangement entered into which shall, in effect, cause the Port of Coos Bay to pay for the money received from the sale thereof a greater rate of interest than six per cent, per annum.

Section 4. Upon the acceptance of the said bid and the sale of said bonds, the said Treasurer, at the expense of the purchaser, shall cause said bonds to be prepared according to the tenor of this ordinance and shall safely keep the same for delivery only upon the further resolution of this board.

DEEPER CHANNEL.

Engineer Leece Has Orders for Work in Coquille River.

The Coquille Sentinel says: "Engineer Leece has been authorized by the Portland office to have the channel deepened in front of the Randolph mill docks. The work was authorized by a letter received by Mr. Leece last Thursday. The work will be done by private contract with the government. The government dredge will do the work while the Johnson company, owners of the mill, will pay for it. The object of the work is to make it possible to load vessels of heavier draught than have been able to land there in the past. It is estimated that about six weeks continuous work will be required for the completion of the improvement."

One of the Features of Big Land Products Show. (Special to The Times.) PORTLAND, Oct. 14.—A potato display bigger than any ever held in the Pacific Northwest is promised for the Land Products Show, to be held in Portland November 18-23. The tubers will be exhibited in 30 pound boxes and there are many entries in this division ranging in size from 10 boxes upward. The first prize is \$100 and a silver cup and there are many other premiums for the best potatoes. Fifty-eight districts of the Pacific Northwest have so far applied for space at the show. This means that the four states participating will be well represented. There is a great deal of interest in the district displays of agricultural products as well as in the district showings of fruit. Attractive prizes are offered in both classes.

WEST HAS A PLAN.

Would Equalize Salaries of Officials of Counties. SALEM, Or., Oct. 12.—Announcement was made today by Governor West that he has secured data showing the amount of salaries paid by all the counties of the state to their officials, and that he will submit this, together with a tentative plan for a bill, which he plans to introduce in the next Legislature equalizing the salaries, to the students of the University of Oregon and the Oregon Agricultural college with the request that they analyze the subject and give their views. The governor plans to use population, assessed valuation and area of counties in equalizing the salaries, and he desires the students to look into the plan and submit whatever recommendations they may have to make. The governor contends that the present salary system is unjust and unequal.

More Strikers

(By Associated Press to The Coos Bay Times) SALT LAKE, Oct. 14.—Rather than assist in handling non-union ore from the Bingham mines, 150 machinists and electricians of the Utah Copper mills at Garfield, walked out today, bringing the number on strike up to 600.

I believe in a reasonable exemption of household and personal effects from taxation, to a valuation of \$500.00.

If elected, I will work for the abolishment of the office of County School Supervisor, as I consider it a useless expenditure of public money.

If elected, I will use my best efforts for the passage of the so-called Blue Sky Law, prohibiting the operation of fake corporations in this state.

If elected, I will refuse to represent any faction and will always aid any resident of the district in any meritorious legislation.
