### WILL PREPARE STATE MAP

State Board of Forestry Will Publish Helpful Information for People.

At a meeting of the state board of forestry, it was decided that a map of the state showing the various classes of timberland and containing a great deal of valuable information besides in regard to roads and location of agricultural basins, should be prepared at once. The step is being taken to promote the work of fire protection in the state and to cooperate with the government forest service and the county road districts. The maps will show location of lands bearing merchantable timber, either of old or second growth, location of brush lands, location of cut over land with marketable second growth, location of other burned tracts and location of lands used for agricultural or grazing purposes.

Men are to be placed in the field immediately getting data for the work and information will all be in by the first of the year. Five thousand dollars has been set aside by the state board for the work, and expenses will be defrayed by sale of the maps to timber concerns and others interested. The United States forest service has set aside \$17,000 for this work. The county road districts are expected to set aside considerable sums for the completion of roads and trails that will assist in fire protection and it is likely that convict labor will be allowed by the governor in the work.

### J. O. STEMMLER ANNOUNCES HIS PLATFORM

I believe in direct presidential primaries.

I believe in the direct vote for United States senators, and until this can be obtained, in Statement No. 1.

I believe and will work for the adoption of an Industrial Compensation Act, whereby each industry will promptly and automatically compensate all persons injured by its operations, without recourse to the Courts.

I believe in legislation relieving the sheriff's office of the collection of taxes, placing it in the hands of a special officer, also a uniform system of collecting, auditing and handling same in every county throughout the state.

I believe in a reasonable exemption of household and personal effects from taxation, to a valuation of \$500.00.

If elected, I will work for the abolishment of the office of County School Supervisor, as I consider it a useless expenditure of public money.

If elected, I will use my best efforts for the passage of the so-called Blue Sky Law, prohibiting the operation of fake corporations in this state.

If elected, I will refuse to represent any faction and will always aid any resident of the district in any meritorious legislation.

### AIRSHIP NOW BIG FACTOR

Important Feature of Warfare Considered by All Nations.

(By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times.)

PARIS, October 12.—The art of aerial warfare has advanced to such a stage that army aeroplanes will now have to be divided into different classes, in the same way as are naval vessels, in the opinion of the heads of the French Army Aviation Corps. Light and mobile aeroplanes easily taken to pieces and transported in wagons which could go anywhere like ammunition wagons will have to be attached to the front to act as the eyes of the army. Just as the cavalry now has its own machine guns, so it will in future have its own aeroplanes. In the rear of the army the heavy armored aeroplanes with high-power motors will be installed in aviation camps. These machines will be the battleships of the air, just as the first line aeroplanes will be the destroyers.

Basing his observations on the performances of the two dirigibles which took part in the recent French war manoeuvres, a French expert concludes that the dirigible in its present form is antiquated and useless. The alleged mobility of the portable balloon-sheds, he declares to be a myth. A dirigible requires 320 men to handle it, while three squadrons of aeroplane need only 250.

The swifter of the two dirigibles employed at the recent manoeuvres took more than ten hours to reconnoitre a radius of 250 miles, while the least rapid biplanes took only two hours and a half to scout a region of 130 miles and other aeroplanes 3 hours 5 minutes to travel about 200 miles.

Counting from the day of departure for the manoeuvres, the thirty-six army airmen who had no accident of any kind, out of the total number of forty-nine engaged in the operations, flew about 22,320 miles altogether. The remaining thirteen who broke down, aggregated 3,224 miles. Adding the 1,984 miles flown by the eight aeroplanes of the reserve, the total distance flown by the aeroplanes engaged in the manoeuvres amounted to 27,528 miles.
