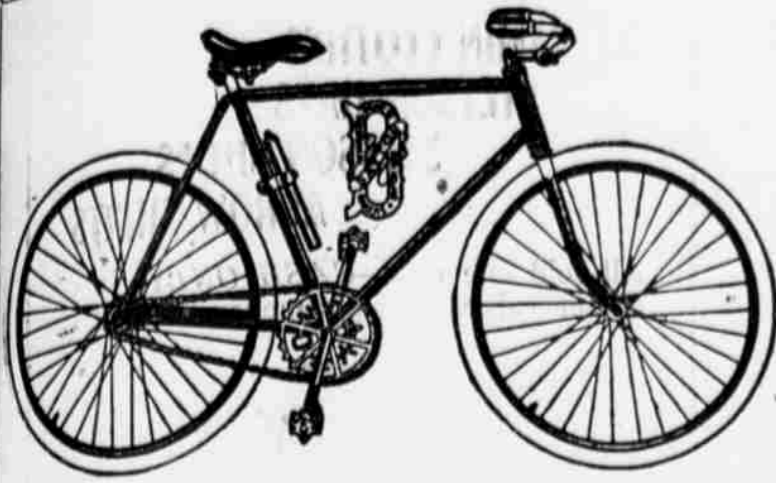

SUICIDE BELIEVED THAT NATURE PROVIDED HIM ONLY A GRAVE

Anthony J. Landeker Fails to Find Place in the World.

BODY FOUND WITH A BULLET IN HEAD

Farmhand at Watson Ranch Leaves Letter Explaining Why He Suicides.

Because he felt that nature had provided for him no place in the world but space for a grave, Anthony J. Landeker, a farm hand on Judge Watson's ranch at Coos Bay, shot himself in the head last night. His body was found in the road this morning. In his pocket was the following rather remarkable letter, explaining why he had taken his own life:

Coos City, October 14. I am tired, tired of living, being nothing but a block in the road. I have decided to move out, out of the same, out of existence. Ever since I can remember I have been what I am now, in the way. Why was I ever born, why ever

TO COMPLETE CARGO.

M.S. Dollar Will Load Lumber at Kalama.

The Portland Journal prints the following: "The British steamer M. S. Dollar is due to arrive at Kalama tonight or tomorrow morning from Coos Bay where she took on a part cargo of lumber for Shanghai. The steamer left Coos Bay yesterday with Captain W. B. Olson, master of the steamer Nann Smith, as pilot. Captain Olson will go to Wilmington, Del., to bring out a new steamer just completed there for the C. A. Smith Lumber company of Marshfield which owns the Nann Smith.

"The M. S. Dollar will fill out her cargo of about 3,500,000 feet at the mill of the Mountain Timber company.

"The British steamer Robert Dollar is due to arrive on the river in a few days to load logs and lumber for Shanghai. The logs will be furnished by the Portland Lumber company and the lumber by the Inman, Poulsen company and the Mountain Timber company. Her cargo too will measure about 3,500,000 feet."

COMMENCE SALVAGE WORK.

Salvage operations upon the bulk of the ill-fated San Francisco and Portland steamer St. Paul, which was wrecked above Eureka several years ago, will again be undertaken in the near future. The steam schooner Acme sailed for Eureka on Thursday, equipped with powerful tackle which will be used in an effort to raise from the sunken steamer the big forty-ton boilers. Several efforts have been made during the last year to take out of the wreck some of the valuable metal portions now submerged, but this is the first time that a vessel of sufficient size to handle the larger portions of the wreck has been dispatched to the scene.—Examiner.

MORE SUPPLIES ARRIVE.

Vessel Waits at Mouth of Siuslaw for Eleven Days.

GARDINER, Or., Oct. 15.—The three-masted schooner Oakland, bound from San Francisco to the Siuslaw river, was towed in the Umpqua river. The vessel is loaded with railroad supplies for Porter Brothers, consisting of powder, dynamite, and railroad iron. The schooner has been beating off the Siuslaw river for 11 days, waiting for a tug from Florence. She will likely be towed to Florence by the tug L. Roscoe in a few days.

Cook, pastor of the Hillsboro Baptist church, officiating in the presence of a few friends and relatives. The bride was tastefully gowned in white and carried white roses. Following the ceremony a wedding luncheon was served. Mr. and Mrs. Sherrill will make their home at Forest Grove. Mr. Sherrill being principal of one of the schools of that place."
